DUBUQUE COMMUNITY SCHOOL DISTRICT Regular Board Meeting July 20, 2020

President Ryan called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. at the Forum with the following members present in person: Parks, Prochaska, Ryan, Wittman. Board members present via Zoom: Bradley, Donohue, Sainci. Additional officers of the Board present: Kelleher, Lucas, Rheingans.

The pledge of allegiance was recited.

Moved (Parks) and seconded (Wittman) to approve the agenda as submitted. Motion carried 7-0.

Moved (Wittman) and seconded (Parks) to approve the minutes of the regular meeting on June 8, the work session on June 22, and the special meeting on June 29, 2020, as submitted. Motion carried 7-0.

Board Salutes

- Foundation for Dubuque Public Schools and the Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque grant for \$18,500 to purchase 6,400 thermometers for district families (at no cost) to assist with daily temperature checks
- Condolences to the family and friends of Lesley Stephens, former district administrator and board member, who passed away unexpectedly on June 23.

Moved (Prochaska) and seconded (Parks) to suspend the rules of order and go into open forum. Motion carried 7-0.

Tim Flynn indicated he was representing the small voice of parents with special needs students whose education is just as important as other students. He feels all students should be in school five days a week. Certain students cannot learn at home or online. They need the structure of the school setting.

Katie Jones is part of a group of volunteers sewing cloth face coverings for students who need them.

Beth Houselog supports the belief that all students should be in school every day. She is concerned with the young learners. She and her husband both work full-time and their children will go to daycare, which seems to reduce the effectiveness of trying to lessen COVID exposure.

Tony White does not support the hybrid model, which does not fit the current family lifestyle. He does not understand the goal of hybrid learning. Most students are unable to learn at home, and parents are not home during the day to teach them. He feels students should be in school every day.

Tracy Demerath applauds the district for putting together a plan that is best for students and staff. As an educator, how do teachers enforce the face covering rule for students who do not want to wear a mask? Many questions remain unanswered. Nothing has prepared us for this.

Natalia Blaskovich supports the hybrid model in an attempt to protect students by social distancing. She wonders if there is flexibility in scheduling for families with teenagers to help with younger students on days they wouldn't be learning in person. That could alleviate some concerns that have been voiced.

Haley Lammer-Heindel is a teacher at Senior High School with two children. She is very concerned about how staff will be protected during the pandemic and how the district will respond to staff who are at risk and how they will be accommodated. She supports the hybrid model. As a teacher, she has questions on contact tracing and notification if students in the school test positive. She wants assurances so teachers can make informed decisions on their employment and their health.

Rebecca Jones is a parent and supports 100% virtual learning for the safety of students and staff.

Kristy Dupont works full-time with overtime. She can't get her school-age children into daycare so she has no one to care for them. Students are currently in sports so why can't they go to school full-time?

Brittany Drake is a teacher in the district and also a parent of special needs students. She is concerned about staff safety.

Moved (Prochaska) and seconded (Parks) to reinstate the rules of order and return to regular session. Motion carried 7-0.

Moved (Parks) and seconded (Wittman) to approve those items listed in the consent agenda. Wittman was auditor for the month. Motion carried 7-0.

Moved (Donohue) and seconded (Sainci) to approve the donation from Andrew McCormick, Eagle Scout, in the amount of \$3,100.00 for a GaGa Ball Pit for Hoover Elementary School. Motion carried 7-0.

Moved (Donohue) and seconded (Parks) to approve Change Order #1 to Conlon Construction Company on the Alta Vista Vocational Technology Classroom Addition Project in the increased amount of \$931.82. Motion carried 7-0.

Moved (Donohue) and seconded (Parks) to approve Change Order #1 to Eastern Iowa Excavating & Concrete, LLC on the Hempstead Parking Lot Expansion Project in the increased amount of \$5,596.50. Motion carried 7-0.



Mr. Prochaska called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

Agenda for August 3, 2020

The agenda was approved as submitted.

Purchase/Professional Services Contracts

Shirley Horstman reported that eight bids were received for face masks. The lowest bid could not guarantee delivery on the required date of 8.12.20. In addition, the Envision mask was better than the design, thickness and face coverage of the First Class Promotional Products mask. Envision was the next best bid and she recommends contracting with them. Envision – face masks for students and staff at an estimated cost of \$51,000.00. Board 8.10.20

Update on Current District Projects

Alta Vista Campus Vocational Technology Building Addition

- 1. Continue to work on finishes in the existing school relocated office space.
- 2. New entrance vestibule aluminum frame and doors to start to be installed this week.
- 3. 75% of new block walls for the addition is installed.
- 4. Contractor will be setting the addition roof structure this week.
- 5. Large retaining wall to the east was poured and they are working on backfilling for the east entrance drive.

Hempstead High School Serving Kitchen Equipment Replacement

- 1. Delivery of the dishwasher was delayed one week from the original delivery timeline.
- 2. The new unit arrived on July 27, with completion of new machine and all connections by the end of the week of August 3.
- 3. Staff training on the new machine likely to be August 11.

Hempstead High School Parking Lot Expansion

Project is complete with the exception of the installation of the stair handrail. This was to be completed by end of July, but the fabricator was shut down due to COVID-19. New tentative schedule has railing fabrication completed by the end of the week of August 3, with installation the following week. This is dependent upon when the fabricator is operational.

Senior High School Renovation Phase 2

Straka Johnson Architects continue to work on Design Development. The Core Planning Group met on July 29 to review current design thoughts. Friends of Lamb-Hedeman Auditorium attended the meeting and shared thoughts on reimagining the possibility of a significant auditorium project with more focus on the student experience rather than the audience experience. More discussion is needed, especially after engaging a Theater Consultant (proposal forthcoming). The mechanical system study continues. It has been confirmed that geothermal is not a good fit for Senior High School, due to the lack of sufficient water in the underground supply, along with the cost of the deep and multiple wells that it would take for a presumed pump-reinject system. However, heat pumps, similar to Phase 1, are still a very viable solution, and can be used with new/existing boilers and chillers/cooling towers. The budget and schedule remain unchanged from that presented at the Board Work Session. Matt Tomkins addressed the committee on behalf of the Friends of Lamb-Hedeman Auditorium and expressed appreciation of the proposed renovations to the Senior High School auditorium. Their priorities are: this space is used by every student in the school, primary focus should be based on the educational opportunities of the students, safety.

Hempstead High School Underground Geothermal Vault Replacement

- 1. The old vault was removed and the new vault was set in place.
- 2. The exiting lines are reinstalled onto the new vault, the hole has been backfilled and ready for finished grades.
- 3. It was discovered that the existing buried 2" pvc electrical conduit had water in it. The district is looking to replace this damaged conduit and wiring.
- 4. Large pile of spoils soil will be removed and taken to district properties.
- 5. This project is scheduled to be completed by the end of the week of August 3.

Irving Elementary School Storm Water Improvements

- 1. Due to the condition of the existing asphalt adjacent to the new concrete curb, an additional 2' wide strip of existing asphalt was removed and replaced.
- 2. All work is completed on the project. Just waiting for the new grass to grow.

Cenergistic Update

Abbi Hammann, Energy Specialist, reported that buildings have been scheduled for the start of school in accordance with ASHRAE COVID 19 regulations and recommendations, flushing the buildings prior to student/staff arrival, strategically scheduling buildings per zones to avoid power surges. The team is also implementing a strategy for power outages to decrease some of the demand piece.

Sale of 2012 Ford Escape

Since this bid exceeded \$5,000.00, a public hearing is required. Board 8.10.20

PPEL and SAVE Reports

Mr. Kelleher presented the PPEL and SAVE expenditure history for 2010-2011 through 2019-2020.

Other Items

In the spring, the district received beverage bids for concession stands. None were accepted due to COVID and not knowing when concession stands could re-open. They can open on August 24, 2020. The intent is to re-bid.

The next meeting was scheduled for September 8, 2020.



Lisa Wittman called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

The agenda was approved as submitted.

Equity Report

Taj Suleyman provided the committee with a final draft of the proposed bylaws for the Community Educational Equity Advisory Committee. Board 8.10.20

Purchase/Professional Service Contract

Julie Lange reported that Edgenuity has been used by the district for the last nine years, mainly for credit recovery. This online platform has coursework that aligns with Iowa Core standards and has been approved by the state of Iowa as one of the choices for online learning platforms. This contract is for digital libraries 6-12 comprehensive all site licenses at an estimated cost of \$89,000.00. Board 8.10.20

IASB Legislative Priorities

Four priorities were selected and will be submitted to IASB for their lobby consideration. Board 8.10.20

Return to Learn Plan

Superintendent Rheingans presented an update on the district's Return to Learn plan. Parents were given a choice of hybrid A/B attendance or fully online learning. 93% of parents responded. 22.2% of students chose the online model. 77.8% of students chose the hybrid model. Rheingans reviewed the percentages by school. State recommendations - Positivity rate (14-day average):

0-5% - fully in-person (hybrid only for parental choice or student quarantine);

6-14% - fully in-person (hybrid only for parental choice or student quarantine);

15-20% + 10% absent – (hybrid for parental choice or student quarantine), district may request 14-day remote learning permission from the state;

Greater than 20% - district may request 14-day remote learning permission from the state.

There have been many questions regarding contact tracing. Last week, new guidance released by the Iowa Department of Education and the Iowa Department of Public Health left additional questions unanswered and placed much additional responsibility on local public health officials and school districts to determine specifics expected to be received in the guidance. Sanctions were received from the state today. For school districts who start fully online, those days will not count. In addition, there are possible licensure sanctions for those superintendents. Rheingans recommends moving the school start date back to August 24 with the hybrid model. This will give the extra time needed to ensure strong collaboration with local public health officials and ultimately provide families with the specifics they seek. The calendar was amended on June 8, 2020, when COVID numbers were decreasing, to start school on August 14 in an attempt to make up lost instruction. He

proposes moving the date back to what was originally the school start date for 2020-2021. This requires a public hearing. Board 8.10.20

Early Retirement *Benefit*

As an incentive to attract employees and reward long service to the District, the Dubuque Community Schools will offer a early retirement plan. The District will provide suitable plans to its employees. This does not include employees eligible under Policy 3604 and its administrative guidelines.

Teachers/Nurses 4308 A1-A3 Classified Employees 4308 B1-B3 The Board extends an offer of early retirement benefits to licensed employees who will be fifty-five (55) by June 30 of the current contract year. Licensed employees are defined as teachers and nurses.

The early retirement plan will be computed based upon the licensed employee's current contract base salary less TSS (Teacher Salary Supplement) as listed on Schedule C and D (not to include extended contract, longevity and supplemental pay).

The District shall make health insurance available to the retiree at his/her own expense until the retiree is Medicare eligible, provided the retiree was eligible for and participated in the District's Health Insurance Program prior to approval of the retirement application. If the employee chooses to continue participation in the District's Health Insurance Program, the employee must notify the Payroll/Benefits office in writing on or before June 1 of the contract year in which the employee intends to retire. The opportunity to purchase health insurance shall continue if permitted by the insurer until the retiree is Medicare eligible. Payment of premiums shall be deducted from the retiree's bank account on the last business day of the month for coverage the following month. Failure to pay the advance premium by the due date shall cancel the insurance coverage and no re-admittance to the program will be allowed. It shall be the responsibility of the retiree to provide any and all information necessary for participation in the program.

An *The* early retirement plan for licensed employees is a discretionary offer by the Board. The Board may discontinue the District's early retirement plan at any time.

A licensed *full-time* employee is eligible for the benefits of an the early retirement plan when the licensed employee:

- Is fifty-five (55) on or before June 30 of the contract year in which the licensed employee wishes to retire (and is at least 55 years of age on the effective date of retirement);
- Completes a minimum of:
 - (A) twenty (20) years of service as an employee of the school district, of which the last five years are consecutive and full-time; or
 - (B) thirty (30) years of service as an employee of the school district, of which the last one (1) year shall be consecutive full-time employment;
- Submits an application to the Superintendent or designee on or before January 15 of the current contract year in which the licensed employee wishes to retire for participation in the plan. Applications submitted after January 15 may be considered at the discretion of the Board depending on the circumstances of the late application;
- Understands that the employee application for the early retirement plan and request for approval of resignation will be acted upon simultaneously by the Board.

A licensed part-time employee is eligible for the benefits of an the carly retirement plan when the licensed employee:

- Is fifty-five (55) on or before June 30 of the contract year in which the licensed employee wishes to retire (and is at least 55 years of age on the effective date of retirement);
- Completes a minimum of:

- (C) twenty (20) years of service as an employee of the school district, of which the last five years are consecutive and full-time; or
- (D) thirty (30) years of service as an employee of the school district, of which the last one (1) year shall be consecutive full-time employment;
- Submits an application to the Superintendent or designee on or before January 15 of the current contract year in which the licensed employee wishes to retire for participation in the plan. Applications submitted after January 15 may be considered at the discretion of the Board depending on the circumstances of the late application;
- Understands that the employee application for the early retirement plan and request for approval of resignation will be acted upon simultaneously by the Board.

Approval by the Board of the licensed employee's early retirement application shall constitute a voluntary resignation. Approval by the Board will authorize the administration to implement and contribute to a plan that utilizes IRS Code Section 403(b) to save both the District and employees payroll taxes on payments to employees at retirement. Payments to the plan will be made on or before July 31 of the year of retirement.

An employee's application for early retirement benefits is not a resignation of a contract with the District. However, approval by the Board of an employee's application for early retirement will be considered a voluntary resignation and termination of his/her continuing contract. Should the Board not approve the application, the employee's contract will remain in effect and he/she will remain as a licensed employee of the District unless he/she otherwise resigns.

Application materials may be obtained from the Human Resource Services office or the Payroll/Benefits office and are to be addressed to the Superintendent of Schools.

Eligible employees may make application for early retirement. providing they have been employed in the District for a minimum period of (A) twenty (20) years, of which the last five (5) years shall be consecutive full-time employment with the District or (B) thirty (30) years of service as an employee of the school district, of which the last one (1) year shall be consecutive full-time employees currently receiving long-term disability benefits are not eligible for the early retirement plan. Each application will be reviewed and will be subject to Board approval. If the Board approves this application, the employee will receive the following cash benefit:

60+ on or before June 30 of the current contract year = 30%

- 59 on or before June 30 of the current contract year = 25%
- 58 on or before June 30 of the current contract year = 20%
- 57 on or before June 30 of the current contract year = 15%
- 56 on or before June 30 of the current contract year = 10%
- 55 on or before June 30 of the current contract year = 5%

Cash benefits are computed as a percentage of the employee's base salary (less TSS amount) at the time of retirement.

The licensed employee who accepts early retirement under this policy will be entitled to all rights and privileges as a retired licensed employee under applicable laws, policies and provisions of the District.

EMPLOYEE'S RETIREMENT PLAN

Voluntary Early Retirement

The Board extends an offer of early retirement benefits to classified employees who will be fifty-five (55) by June 30 of the current contract year. Classified employees are defined as those members of the following employee groups who work five (5) days per week: Food Service, Maintenance, Service, Transportation, Bus Drivers/Bus Attendants, Mechanics/Truck Drivers, Educational Paraprofessionals, Educational Secretaries, Administrative Assistants, and other classified employees.

To be eligible for early retirement benefits, applicants shall have worked five (5) days per week and shall have been employed in the District for twenty (20) years, of which the last five (5) years shall be consecutive. Employees who are currently receiving long-term disability benefits are not eligible for the early retirement plan.

The classified employee who accepts early retirement under this policy will be entitled to all rights and privileges as a retired classified employee under applicable laws, policies and provisions of the District.

An early retirement plan for classified employees is a discretionary offer by the Board. The Board may discontinue the District's early retirement plan at any time.

All eligible classified employees may make application for early retirement benefits to the Superintendent or designee. Applications for early retirement must be received prior to April 1 of the current contract year and ninety (90) days prior to the effective date of retirement. Applications submitted after March 31 may be considered at the discretion of the Board depending on the circumstances of the late application.

A classified employee who accepts early retirement will receive a cash benefit as follows: 60+ on or before June 30 of the current contract year = 30%

59 on or before June 30 of the current contract year = 25%

58 on or before June 30 of the current contract year = 20%

57 on or before June 30 of the current contract year = 15%

56 on or before June 30 of the current contract year = 10%

55 on or before June 30 of the current contract year = 5%

All payments will be based on an employee's averaged past three year's (base) contract salary.

Further Information:

- Approval by the Board of the classified employee's early retirement application shall constitute a voluntary resignation. Approval by the Board will authorize the administration to implement and contribute to a plan that utilizes IRS Code Section 403(b) to save both the district and employees payroll taxes on payments to employees at retirement. Payments to the plan will be made on or before July 31 of the year of retirement.
- B) The District shall make health insurance available (until the retiree is Medicare eligible) to the retiree at his/her own expense provided the retiree was eligible for and participated in the District's Health Insurance Program prior to approving the retirement application. If the employee chooses to participate in the Health Insurance Program, the employee must notify the Payroll/Benefits Office, in writing, on or before June 1 of the contract year in which the employee intends to retire. The opportunity to purchase health insurance shall continue if permitted by the insurer until the retiree is Medicare eligible. Payment of premiums shall be deducted from the retiree's bank account on the last business day of the month for coverage the following month. Failure to pay the advance premium by the due date shall cancel the insurance coverage and no re-admittance to the program will be allowed. It shall be the responsibility of the retiree to provide any and all information necessary for participation in the program.
- C) An employee's application for early retirement benefits is not a resignation from employment with the District. However, acceptance by the Board of an employee's application for early retirement will be considered as a voluntary resignation and termination of his/her employment. Should the Board not approve the application, the employee's contract will remain in effect and he/she will remain as a classified employee of the District unless he/she otherwise resigns.
- D) Application materials may be obtained from the Human Resource Services office or the Payroll/Benefits office and are to be addressed to the Superintendent of Schools.

School Attendance

Mandatory Attendance

According to Section 299.1 of the Iowa Code, the parent, guardian, or legal or actual custodian of a child who is of compulsory attendance age is accountable for the child's attendance at school. Section 299.1A of the Iowa Code mandates that children who have reached the age of six and are under sixteen years of age by September 15 are of compulsory attendance age for that school year.

A child who has reached the age of five by September 15 and who is enrolled in a school district shall be considered to be of compulsory attendance age unless the parent or guardian of the child notifies the school district in writing of the parent's or guardian's intent to remove the child from enrollment in the school district.

A child who has reached the age of four by September 15 and who is enrolled in the statewide preschool program under chapter 256C shall be considered to be of compulsory attendance age unless the parent or guardian of the child submits written notice to the school district implementing the program of the parent's or guardian's intent to remove the child from enrollment in the preschool program.

School Attendance and Punctuality

Any day or part day of instruction missed, whether excused or unexcused impacts a student's learning. Families play a key role in making sure their children attend school on time every day. It is important that both schools and families understand why attendance is important for school and success. Parents/guardians are strongly urged to schedule vacation during the summer and various breaks in the school calendar. All students including students over the compulsory attendance age will be held to the Dubuque Community School District attendance policy. Each school will have procedures to address school attendance and punctuality.

Absences

Parents will notify the school and provide the reason for each absence of their child. Schools will analyze attendance data and engage parents and students to generate solutions to improve school attendance. Generally, absences of 5% or less of current membership days represent good attendance. Missing between 5% and 10% of the current membership days can significantly impact a child's academic achievement. Chronic absenteeism is missing 10% or more of the school year. Based on the unique circumstances of each absence, the principal or designee will make the final decision on whether the absence is excused or unexcused. The principal or designee may request documentation or verification for any of the following absences and may consider an excess of absences (more than 10% of current membership days) as unexcused truant days.

Excused Absence

The following reasons may be identified as possible excused absences: personal illness, professional appointments which cannot be arranged outside of school time, recognized religious observances, required court appearances, College visits, pre-arranged/approved absences (contact school office in advance of absence), bereavement, and out-of-school suspensions.

The district believes that traditional, in-person school attendance leads to the greatest learning opportunities for students. However, there may be rare and unusual circumstances created by public emergencies declared by state or local officials which temporarily prevent students from attending traditional, in-person school. In these circumstances, the superintendent will have discretion to make reasonable accommodations for students, on a case-by-case basis, to attend school through remote learning opportunities within the available resources of the district and as permitted by law. During approved remote learning, attendance will be taken, assessments may be administered, and grades will count towards students' cumulative grade point average as if they were attending in person. The provision of special education and accommodations for students who have individualized education programs (IEPs) or Section 504 plans will be determined by each respective IEP or Section 504 team.

Unexcused Absence

Unexcused absences will include, but not be limited to, the following: class cuts, falsely informing the school about the reasons(s) for the absence, and failure to contact schools.

Truancy

Students are expected to be in attendance every day of the school calendar and parents, guardians, legal or actual custodians are expected to assure attendance of their children. In accordance with 299.8 of the Iowa Code, any child of compulsory attendance age who fails to attend school as required by the school board's policy or who fails to attend competent private instruction under chapter 299A, without reasonable excuse for the absence, shall be deemed to be a truant.

According to Iowa Code, 299.5A, if a parent, guardian, legal or actual custodian, or child refuses to accept the school's attempt to assure the child's attendance or the school's attempt to assure the child's attendance is otherwise unsuccessful, the truancy liaison shall refer the matter to the county attorney for mediation or prosecution.

Academic Accountability

Students who are absent from school miss instruction which could negatively impact the student's grades. Students are required to do make-up work within a reasonable amount of time for all absences. Teachers will provide full credit and if necessary, additional and/or alternative instructional interventions for each and every absence. Additionally, no student will be dropped from classes based exclusively on attendance.

Absences may impact grades in the following ways:

- Failure to attend make-up sessions as assigned.
- Failure to complete make-up assignments satisfactorily within a reasonable time is a separate act and constitutes grounds for reduced grades.

Mediation/Prosecution

In accordance with Section 299.1B of the Iowa Code, students under the age of 18 who are not in daily attendance may be referred by the superintendent to the Iowa Department of Transportation for the suspension of their driver's license.

If interventions have not resulted in satisfactory attendance, the case may be referred to the county attorney's office as outlined in 299.5A, Mediation, of the Iowa Code. The school district shall be responsible for monitoring any agreements arrived at through mediation. If a parent,

guardian, legal or actual custodian refuses to engage in mediation or violates a term of the agreement, the matter shall be referred to the county attorney's office for prosecution under section 299.8 of the Iowa Code.

The truancy liaison may refer a truant and his or her parents/guardian to the County Attorney's office if mediation breaks down without an agreement being reached. Any person who violates a mediation agreement is subject to Iowa Code 299.6.

Administrative Guidelines

School Attendance

Absences

Principals will be responsible for designating school personnel who address attendance issues. Elementary: Students who arrive late, leave early or otherwise miss a block of time up to 90 minutes will be considered tardy. Time missed over 90 minutes will be a half day absence. Middle and High School: Attendance is taken each class period. Each school will develop protocol to address tardiness.

Interventions

Each school's *plan* will include a series of interventions designed to provide school personnel with methods to work with families to improve student attendance and punctuality. These interventions begin with notification to students and their family and increase in intensity if attendance does not improve. It should be noted that notification alone is not considered an adequate response to persistent truancy. In choosing an intervention, authorized school personnel will consider the student's attendance history. Interventions will begin at the first sign of an attendance problem and may include, but are not limited to, the following:

Student conference with school personnel (may include truancy liaison) Agency referral Consequences and interventions as stated in Policy 5200 Medical evaluation Parent contact (phone calls/written communication/electronic communication) Parent conference with school personnel Referral to an alternate program Referral to truancy liaison for possible mediation Student improvement plans Suspension of Driver's License Referral for evaluation to determine eligibility for a 504 Plan

Revoking Driver's License

Iowa code 299.1B Failure to Attend-Driver's License

A person who does not attend a public school, an accredited nonpublic school, competent private instruction in accordance with the provisions of chapter 299A, an alternative school, or adult education classes shall not receive an intermediate or full driver's license until age eighteen.

A student who is 16 and no longer of compulsory attendance age, but who has not reached the age of 18, will have his/her driving privilege suspended if he/she no longer attends a public school, an accredited nonpublic school, competent private instruction, an alternative school, or adult education classes.

The building principal or designee shall make the referral using the Revoking Driver's License form and send the form to the Director of Student Services.

Upon review of the information, the Director of Student Services shall forward the information to the Superintendent of the Dubuque Schools for a signature.

The superintendent shall send the signed form to the Iowa Department of Transportation (IDOT). If a student decides to re-enroll after having his/her license revoked, it is up to the student to work with the IDOT to prove he/she is re-enrolled and to provide appropriate documentation in an effort to regain his/her driver's license.

Dubuque Community School District, Community Educational Equity Advisory Committee Bylaws (Concurrence)

Article I Organization

The name of this organization shall be the Community Educational Equity Advisory Committee (CEEAC). The CEEAC is an advisory committee appointed by the Dubuque Community School District (DCSD) and enjoys a shared sense of empowerment with all administrative offices of the DCSD. The committee serves to advise the Director of Equity, Superintendent, and the School Board on issues related to diversity, Culture of Belonging and equity.

Article II Mission Statement

The CEEAC is a broad and diverse committee supporting and advising the DCSD with the coordination and development of policies, programs, resources, and methods to increase maximum achievement for all students in a multi-cultural and equitable environment that is safe for all stakeholders of the DCSD.

Article III Foundational Beliefs

The foundational beliefs of the committee are:

A. diversity will be an integral and celebrated part of all education programs, curriculum and extracurricular activities for students;

B. students need to have like role models in their classrooms and school; this can be accomplished through a strong affirmative action program;

C. students and staff have the right to be educated and to work in a harassment- free environment, and;

D. integration on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, age, or disability in our schools and education programs will help to prepare students to live more positively in a diverse world.

Article IV Purpose

The purpose of this organization is to:

- 1. oppose inequity, prejudice, bias, micro-aggression, segregation and discrimination anywhere in the school system;
- 2. promote nondiscriminatory and equal opportunity efforts in employment practices;
- 3. promote a multicultural and equitable approach and environment to

learning in all areas of the school curriculum;

- 4. develop a strategy to give life to the committee's foundational beliefs;
- 5. promote professional in-service experiences for the teaching staff, administrators, Board of Education, non-certified personnel of the school system and the CEEAC members when appropriate;
- 6. Serve as advisors to the Superintendent and Director of Equity, as well as other district administrative offices, committees and the Board of Education;
- 7. serve as liaisons between the school district and members of diverse community groups;
- 8. support the development of programs, educational strategies and curriculum that promote positive human relations among diverse groups, when facilitated by the Director of Equity;
- 9. provide input into the development and evaluation of equity reports, updates and any other equity reviews including the annual report of the system;
- 10. make recommendations and suggestions to the Director of Equity to facilitate the accomplishment of equity goals for the district;
- 11. assist the Director of Equity in the reviewing of progress reports regarding equity programs in the district and equity legislation applicable to the DCSD;
- 12. collaborate with the Director of Equity to serve as liaison between parents, guardians, patrons and the school district employees to equity issues;
- 13. relay issues of community interest and concern related to equal employment opportunity, affirmative action, equal educational opportunity, and multicultural/gender fair education to the school administration and school board;
- 14. relay information on school educational and employment equity activities to community at large;
- 15. observe all district programs and employment policies and practices to assess the degree, which promote multicultural/gender fair concepts and provide transparency for under-represented communities;

- 16. promote more positive inter-group relations within the community as well as to foster positive inter-group understanding and skills among students, employees, and the community;
- 17. provide inclusive and insightful support for the Director of Equity on inclusive educational programming and the Equal Employment Opportunity/Affirmative Action Plan.

Article V Membership

- The composition of this organization shall-consist of not less than twelve (12) and no more than twenty (20) members. Their terms are three years of no more than two consecutive terms.
- 2. The Director of Equity will staff and serve as a permanent member of the committee, voting only in cases of ties and not serving as an officer.
- 3. Committee membership should reflect the ethnic, racial, geographical, religious, sexuality, age, disability and educational interest diversity of the entire DCSD.
- 4. Committee shall be balanced by gender in accordance with Iowa Code 69.16A.
- 5. In choosing additional members and replacement members, the committee's key focus will be to ensure key population constituencies are well represented in the committee membership.
- 6. Committee members must demonstrate a commitment to the foundational beliefs of the committee, a passion for and vested interest in diversity issues, and advocacy for diverse populations in their day-to-day lives.

Article VI Resignation and vacancies

- 1. Any member desiring to resign from the committee prior to the end of their term, shall present their resignation in writing to the CEEAC.
- 2. Vacancies may be filled by the CEEAC to complete the unexpired term of the member who resigned through the regular membership process.

Article VII Officers and Elections

- 1. The Equity Advisory Committee will elect a Chairperson, a Vice-Chairperson and Secretary.
- 2. The election of inaugural officers will be conducted at the annual meeting in October 2020 or soon thereafter. Newly elected officers shall be seated at the

following meeting.

3. Any officer may be re-elected to their office or may be eligible for another elective office.

Article VIII Terms of Membership

- 1. Membership is limited to individuals who live and work in DCSD boundaries, are employed by the DCSD, or attend or serve as guardian for someone who attends a DCSD school.
- 2. Members shall be appointed by the Director of Equity to a term of three years, except when the CEEAC shall first be created. Any member may be reappointed without limitation as to the number of terms served. Members shall be appointed the founding year in a staggered manner, four members shall be appointed for a term of four years, three members for a term of three years, two members for a term of two years, and all other members for a term of one year. Student representatives will serve for no more than two consecutive three-year terms.

Article IX Officers

- 1. The officers of the CEEAC shall be the following: Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, and Secretary.
- 2. The officers of the CEEAC shall be elected annually in May by a consensus building of the voting members of the CEEAC. The vote shall be recorded for public record.
- 3. Officers of the CEEAC shall be elected for a term of two (2) years.
- 4. An officer may be re-elected to office or may be eligible for another elective office.

Article X Meetings

- 1. Unless an alternative date is determined by a majority of the committee, the regular meeting of the CEEAC shall be held monthly during the school calendar year between the general committee and the subcommittees on the third Wednesday of the month with the agenda set by the Chairperson in cooperation with the Director of Equity. Additional meetings may be called by the Chair.
- Proper notice will be given for all meetings under the Open Meetings Act. Meeting notices will be published in the Board Meeting Calendar.
- 3. Official business will be conducted in the presence of the voting members

present at the meeting.

- 4. CEEAC members are expected to attend all regularly scheduled meetings to assure full community representation on the CEEAC at all times. Excused absences (sickness, death in family, business trips, emergencies, etc.) shall not affect a member's status. If a member has unexcused absences equaling or exceeding 50% of scheduled meetings if 2-3 meetings are held in a school calendar year, or a member has unexcused absences equaling or exceeding 25% of 4 or more meetings held in a school calendar year, the CEEAC may recommend the Director of Equity and the Superintendent request the member's resignation or replace the committee member.
- 5. Committee business shall not conflict with applicable Federal, State, or Local laws or School Board policies.
- 6. All meetings are open to the public and will be publicly announced.
- 7. The minutes of each meeting shall be distributed to the School Board of Directors of the DCSD.
- 8. A quorum shall consist of 50% of the members plus one. Presence of a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for conduct of business. In the absence of a physical presence, members may attend meetings via electronic means such as telephone, video conference, etc.

XI Report

The CEEAC shall submit an annual report to the Superintendent regarding committee work and recommendations related to the planning, implementation, and evaluation of the equal employment opportunity, affirmative action, equal educational opportunity, and multicultural/gender fair and equitable education, priority initiatives, and strategic planning. The CEEAC shall also assist the Director of Equity in the preparation of annual evaluation reports regarding equity compliance and commitment of the DCSD.

XII Amendment of the by laws

- 1. If the Committee determines that the by-laws should be amended, a by-laws committee shall be appointed by the Director of Equity to draft the requested amendment. The amended by– laws shall be submitted in writing to the membership for approval and shall be adopted if approved by the committee.
- 2. All written applications and/or by appointment, along with recommendations, shall be submitted to the Director of Equity and copies made available to the CEEAC. The Director of Equity will receive applications and make recommendations for interview. A subcommittee from the current CEEAC,

which includes the Director of Equity, will interview candidates and make recommendations for the new members to the full CEEAC. The CEEAC will vote to approve membership.

- 3. Membership for the inaugural the committee will begin in October 2020. Subsequent membership shall commence upon approval by the Director of Equity and the Superintendent.
- 4. Those appointed to serve on the CEEAC to replace a member who has resigned or has been asked to resign, shall complete the term of said member and have the option of serving another term.
- 5. A committee member can be dismissed for persistent, pervasive, or severe violations of the CEEAC bylaws or school board policies.
- **6.** Committee members may be reapplying for membership to serve for another term not to exceed six years consecutively.

2020 IASB/UEN Legislative Action Priorities

Dubuque Community School District Recommendations

1. #**DCSD**

The cost per pupil must be sufficient to fuel school districts and AEAs, but adequacy is not enough. Equity requires our formula to meet student need as poverty in Iowa has nearly doubled in the last two decades. Iowa's school formula must recognize the needs of students from low-income or non-English speaking families, or at-risk of dropping out, to fund programs for student success.

2. **#3. PRESCHOOL**

Supports continued funding to ensure that all 4-year-olds have access to Statewide <u>Voluntary</u> Preschool Program. Supports an increase in funding from the current weighting of 0.5 to 1.0 full-time equivalent to increase the ability of districts to provide services such as full-day programming and transportation to ensure that all 4-year-olds have the ability to attend the Statewide <u>Voluntary</u> Preschool Program. Districts should be given maximum flexibility to assign costs to the program.

3. #7. MENTAL HEALTH

Supports efforts to establish comprehensive community mental health systems to offer preventative and treatment services and comprehensive school mental health programs that include in-school access for students to mental health professionals and provisions for reimbursement by Medicaid and private insurers. Supports additional ongoing teacher, administrator, and support staff training to improve the awareness and understanding of child emotional and mental health needs. Supports incentives for workforce development for mental health professionals in schools.

4. **#10 AREA EDUCATION AGENCIES**

Supports full funding of the area education agencies to provide essential services in a cost-effective manner to school districts including, but not limited to: special education; technology; professional development; curriculum assessment; and student assessment data analysis.

PUBLIC EDUCATION

Public education is the foundation of our democratic society and the key to successful futures for lowa children. Quality public schools strengthen our communities and are the cornerstone of any sound economic development policy. The state must put public education first and provide sufficient funding and support services. The state should provide full funding to public schools to meet the evolving needs of public school students before additional financial support of non-public schools is provided.

All schools that receive any public funds, including property taxes, state aid or federal monies, should be subject to the same governance and educational standards as public school districts.

GOVERNANCE

lowa has one of the finest public educational systems in the United States. The federal government, governor, General Assembly, Iowa Department of Education, school boards, professional educators and the public should strive to keep it strong. There must be a proper balance of state and federal control designed to ensure quality and a standard of education for all students, with local control which allows local school boards flexibility and decision-making authority to innovate and adapt to local needs and community values.

School districts are governed by boards that, as elected representatives, must be responsive and responsible to the citizens of the school district. Citizen involvement is the key to our representative form of government.

Local boards are, within the guidelines established by state law, vested with the authority to make the final decision on matters pertaining to a school district, area education agency (AEA) or community college. Local board members, who are closely connected to students, families and the communities in which they live, are best capable of understanding student needs and identifying effective solutions. The statutory duties and responsibilities of the local board cannot be delegated to persons who are not elected by the voters of the school district.

Locally elected school boards must have control over the content and management of their educational program, including the calendar and the flexibility for innovation and decision-making. A leadership team composed of the superintendent, principals and supervisory personnel working with the board is necessary for the efficient operation of the school district.

SCHOOL CHOICE

lowa law provides sufficient choice through public charter schools, open enrollment, home school assistance, postsecondary enrollment options and nonpublic school alternatives. Additional investments in tax credits for nonpublic tuition or other options are not necessary to provide educational choice.

SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS

Through original research and a close evaluation of highly effective board practices across the country, IASB recognizes the following five essential roles of effective school boards and encourages all Iowa board members to incorporate these principles in carrying out the mission of public education in their communities:

- Setting Clear, High Expectations: The board sets a vision which expresses a commitment to high expectations, consistently communicates the expectations, sets clear and focused goals and focuses on improving instruction.
- Creating the Conditions that Support Successful Teaching and Learning: The board creates the conditions for success by showing commitment via board actions, resource allocations and system alignment; provides quality, research-based professional development for educators; builds commitment and focus throughout the system and stays the course, solving problems along the way so improvements have time to work.
- Holding the System Accountable for Student Success: The board uses data and monitoring to hold the system accountable and to make decisions at the board table; identifies clear, understandable indicators that the board will accept as evidence of progress and success; and supports and monitors progress regularly at the board table with staff leaders.
- Building Collective Will: Within the school staff and throughout the community, the board creates widespread awareness and urgency of the improvement required to meet students' needs, instills hope that it's possible to change, and connects with and engages the community in a frank and ongoing effort to encourage each facet to fulfill its responsibility.
- Learning Together as a Board/Superintendent Team: The board establishes board learning time around school improvement efforts, engages in deep conversations about the implications of learning, builds a trusting and supportive relationship with the superintendent, and leads thoughtful policy development.

ELECTIONS

Participation in the democratic process is integral to the success of schools. School districts have a responsibility for promoting more community involvement in the election process to foster better-informed citizens and greater ownership in public education. Student achievement should drive decisions that impact school elections.

In keeping with the principles of democracy, IASB is committed to the concept of each vote having equal value and a simple majority vote as sufficient to determine election or taxation decisions.

School board elections **should** coincide with the opening of school. Due to boundary differences and to help maintain the nonpartisan status of school board elections, they should be separate from any other election.

School board members should be elected in a non-partisan manner in which decisions are based on the best interest of the school and students without regard to party affiliation. Boards should have less than a majority of board members elected in any one year.

School boards should have flexibility to determine when special elections are necessary and to schedule these to best suit the district's needs.

IOWA ASSOCIATION OF SCHOOL BOARDS

IASB is committed to statewide leadership to ensure high achievement for all lowa students. IASB recognizes that school boards are in a strategic position to bring about continuous improvement in public education through governance, public policies and advocacy.

We believe that IASB is the organization most appropriate to deliver training and board development to school board members about their role and responsibilities to contribute to high student achievement.

SCHOOL DISTRICT ORGANIZATION

School boards, and the residents of the school districts involved, have the primary responsibility to determine the makeup and boundaries of school districts and attendance centers.

The school board and the citizens of a school district assess the quality and extent of its educational program and determine whether the school district continues to operate within its present geographical boundaries.

In order to reduce costs and maintain or enrich a quality public education, IASB encourages school districts to share administrators, teachers, equipment, facilities and transportation, including the scheduling of joint classes and extracurricular activities. Sharing does not necessarily lead to eventual reorganization.

IASB believes school district reorganization, dissolution or sharing may be appropriate when:

- The best interest of students is the most important factor considered.
- The reorganization or dissolution is voluntary—initiated and voted upon by the citizens of the school districts involved.
- The state offers sufficient incentives to make the reorganization or sharing financially attractive to the school districts involved.
- Geographical issues are considered, including minimizing the amount of travel time by students and allowing for continued community participation by the communities involved.

PUBLIC RECORDS AND OPEN MEETINGS

The schools belong to the people - the citizens and taxpayers of the school district. The public has the right to know what decisions are being made regarding the education of their young people and the expenditure of their tax dollars. School districts should have the ability to determine the method of public notice dissemination that maximizes public access to records at a minimal cost to the district.

Although it may not always be easy to publicly consider and discuss some of the tough issues confronting school boards, school boards should be responsive to the open meetings and public records policy established in state law. Compliance with the intent of the public records and open meetings law is best achieved through education, training and consistent enforcement.

Every citizen has the right to examine and copy all public records. The news media may publish public records, unless the law expressly limits the right or requires public records to be kept confidential.

SCHOOL FINANCE

School finance decisions, whether at the local, state or federal level, should put student achievement first in all decisions. Iowa's school funding system must provide all Iowa children an equal opportunity to a quality public school education. The funding system must recognize that a high-quality public education is the first and foremost economic engine of our state.

A sufficient funding system provides equitable, sufficient, predictable and timely funding, based on these foundational principles:

Equity: Iowa should fund public education with a student-driven formula, ensuring Iowans that the education of each student is supported equitably. The formula must provide sufficient revenue to cover the actual cost of the educational program, including on-time funding for districts experiencing increasing enrollment. The state should allow school districts with declining enrollment to maintain sufficient funding so the school district can adjust operations to meet student needs. The state should minimize the disparity for property taxpayers due to variances in property valuation per pupil.

Excellence and Opportunity: School finance must provide for continuous improvement of classroom instruction and promote excellence. A critical attribute of increasing the achievement of all children is the skill level of teachers and administrators in the school. Therefore, the school funding system must provide for the professional training and development of teachers and administrators, and school improvement that will promote lowa as a national leader in public education.

Stability: The school funding system must continue to be a fair balance between property taxes, which are a stable and reliable revenue source, and other revenue sources. Iowa school boards are grateful for categorical funds but encourage the state to provide resources through the funding formula to maximize local flexibility and provide growth through an equity-based system. School districts should have spending authority for any reduction in state funding.

Efficiency: A diverse system of school finance helps schools control costs. To ensure wellmanaged and efficient schools, the school funding system must encourage cooperative ventures and the pooling of resources and services. The school funding system must address increased costs due to inflation and other economic factors.

Local Control: State funding must support local control. Locally elected school boards should have the authority to utilize and allocate funding to best meet the needs of students. If the state decides to intervene in local education policy, any mandated changes, particularly those taking energy and focus away from real comprehensive school improvement and student achievement, must be fully funded by the state without a shift from other education resources.

SCHOOL INFRASTRUCTURE

The state has a role to ensure that all lowa public school students have equitable access to highquality educational programs, provided in safe, efficient, accessible, and technology-ready facilities that promote student learning.

Revenues from the Secure an Advanced Vision for Education (SAVE) fund provide school districts with a stable, long-term, and equitable funding stream for infrastructure purposes and should not be negatively altered or discontinued.

EDUCATION'S ROLE IN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Growth focused on economic stability, wealth creation, entrepreneurship and knowledge-based enterprises is a vital objective for the state of Iowa. Our public schools contribute to the growth of Iowa's economy through the education and development of our children and by providing good jobs. Our public school districts are often the largest employer in many Iowa communities.

A quality public education system is both a key factor contributing to lowa's quality of life and is a critical attractor of business to lowa. While education contributes to lowa's economy, it is also dependent upon economic growth for securing sufficient financial resources to provide quality education services.

Public education and economic growth are interdependent. It is therefore imperative that Iowa invest in viable and sustainable economic development and foster partnerships between education and the private sector.

Collaboration between public schools and the business community can enhance students' knowledge of career paths and future employment opportunities.

EDUCATIONAL STANDARDS AND ACCOUNTABILITY

It is the responsibility of local school boards to ensure that all students are educated for success in a 21st-century global society. Collaboration between Pre-K-12 and postsecondary institutions should be encouraged to help increase student opportunities.

School boards must ensure that their district operates from clear, measurable student learning standards and improvement goals; sufficient resources are allocated to improve instruction; and there is public accountability for improved results for students.

It is appropriate for the state to establish high and rigorous educational standards for the accreditation of public and nonpublic schools. Standards should be designed to ensure that all students have the opportunity to receive the educational program that meets their needs. The students of Iowa who attend public and nonpublic schools should receive their education instruction from licensed teachers and properly accredited instructors. All public-school accreditation standards must also be applied to nonpublic schools.

Data collection and reporting is necessary to improve instruction and increase student achievement. Data collection and reporting is valuable when:

- It is possible to accurately determine student achievement gains, gaps between subgroups and level of attainment for all students;
- Purposes are clearly understood and worthy;
- Assessments are aligned with the intended purposes;
- Results are easily accessible to maximize school district use of the information to provide quality professional development and improve instruction; and,

• Results lend themselves to widespread understanding and evaluation by all school stakeholders.

The state or federal government must not use single-source data to issue sanctions, make generalizations about student performance or shift resources away from schools that require support to improve learning.

lowa school districts should have the opportunity to comply with standards using various structures and mediums, including sharing and interactive telecommunications.

IASB supports assessment systems that measure student growth for all students, also known as value-added growth or gain, to improve student outcomes by driving professional development, teacher and administrator evaluation, and school improvement decisions.

EDUCATION TECHNOLOGY

Technology is an important tool in providing a quality public education. School districts must have equitable access to technology. Access includes provision of hardware and software, technological support staff and access to a variety of Internet, broadband and network services including the lowa Communications Network (ICN).

Administration of the ICN should continue to prioritize educational access above other users. The state has a role in ensuring equitable access to technology and should provide sufficient resources to purchase technology, support school technology plans and include professional development for educators on how to use technology to improve instruction and student outcomes.

EARLY CHILDHOOD

Exposure to education in the first years of life is critical, and young children have an innate desire to learn. That desire can be supported or undermined by early experiences.

High-quality early childhood education promotes intellectual, language, mathematical, physical, social, emotional and creative development, cultivates a child's curiosity and desire to learn, and builds a strong foundation for later academic and social success. The state plays a critical role by defining and supporting quality early childhood education programs.

STUDENTS

All students can achieve at high levels when the state, local school boards and communities provide resources and support to ensure each child's success in school. It is the responsibility of school boards to meet the needs of every student. It is the responsibility of parents/guardians and communities to work collaboratively with school districts to meet the needs of every student.

SCHOOL SAFETY

IASB believes that schools must be a safe environment for all students, staff and visitors.

Each member of the school and community must be a partner in providing schools with resources, quality leadership, and united support for the development of a locally determined approach to

ensure a secure learning environment for all children. IASB supports a comprehensive view of safety that considers threats such as crime and violence as well as hazards such as natural disasters or accidents. Security planning efforts must include prevention, preparedness, mitigation, and response efforts. These planning efforts must be practiced, evaluated and updated on an ongoing basis. All individuals in the school community must be well-trained and knowledgeable of the best practices in school safety.

While all members of the school community benefit from accurate and timely information on safety efforts, school boards must have the authority to maintain appropriate levels of confidentiality to protect security plans and measures.

TEACHER QUALITY

IASB believes, and research confirms, that teacher quality is the most important factor in determining a child's academic success.

It is the responsibility of the school board through the superintendent and administrators to ensure teachers in their district are qualified for the job they are hired to do. School boards have the authority to set high performance standards and expect demonstrated academic and instructional excellence from their teachers.

Therefore, boards need to ensure teachers, as a part of their job, continuously and collaboratively study content, instruction and the effect on students based upon identified student needs.

It is a board responsibility to expect and confirm that the district is fully implementing the Iowa Core Standards and Iowa Professional Development Model for the purpose of improving instruction measured by improved student achievement.

Quality teaching is essential to high student achievement. In order to recruit the best and the brightest teachers into Iowa and the profession, keep the best and the brightest teachers we now have, and increase respect for the profession that most impacts our children's future, IASB strongly advocates for school funding levels sufficient to pay competitive wages. In addition, IASB believes school boards must focus on ensuring a school culture that supports engaging educators in decision making, providing teachers with leadership opportunities and professional development, and exploring compensation and evaluation systems designed to enhance performance and retention.

EDUCATOR PREPARATION AND LICENSURE

IASB supports improved alignment between teacher preparation and the Pre-K-12 education systems. Preparation programs should be evaluated continually with the objective of providing training that reflects innovative and proven education methods designed to assess and maximize student achievement. Student needs must drive preparation programs. School boards, teacher preparation institutions, and the state must cooperate to ensure teachers obtain the knowledge and skills they need to teach to ensure all children can learn. Educators should be prepared to effectively teach the wide variety of students in Iowa classrooms. All Iowa educators must have the appropriate licensure, endorsements and accreditation from the board of educational examiners.

PERSONNEL EVALUATION

School employees must be accountable for raising student achievement. An objective evaluation of all employees, performed on a regular basis, benefits the employee and the community and assists students in obtaining a quality public school education. IASB supports the right of school boards to exercise their authority to set standards of performance and establish rules of conduct for all employees.

Administrators or their designees must have the authority and resources to evaluate personnel whom they supervise.

EMPLOYEE RELATIONS AND COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

Positive labor relations enhance the ability of employees and school boards to work together for improved student achievement. Ideally, collective bargaining should end in a voluntary settlement between parties.

School boards should be guaranteed sufficient management rights necessary to operate the school district efficiently and effectively.

The results of collective bargaining should be to:

- Advance excellence and equity in public education with the outcome of improved student achievement for all.
- Reflect sound research and proven best practices with a demonstrated positive impact on improving student achievement.
- Promote accountability by all for improved student outcomes.
- Include a regular evaluation of the impact of changes on student achievement.
- Preserve the constitutionally protected due process rights of school boards.
- Promote safe, healthy, effective and respectful work environments for students and staff.

BENEFITS

It is important to establish employee benefits necessary to attract and retain qualified employees. Benefits paid and contribution rates should maintain the actuarial soundness and affordability of employee benefit programs.

Unemployment compensation benefits should be reserved for those who experience sudden and unexpected job loss. It should not be extended between academic terms to employees who have contracts for less than 12 months or who have reasonable assurance of continued employment.

Substitute employees should not be eligible for unemployment compensation.

School district employees whose employment is terminated because of a reduction or realignment of staff, or for other reasons that would qualify them for unemployment compensation benefits, should be eligible to receive such benefits on the same basis as employees in private sector employment.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

A State Board of Education, made up of laypersons, determines and adopts necessary rules and regulations for the proper enforcement and execution of the provisions of school laws, and adopts and prescribes standards for carrying out the provisions of the school laws. The State Board of Education must seek advice and counsel from a broad range of citizens and educational organizations in the formulation of rules and policies.

The Department of Education (DE) plays a significant role in facilitating school improvement efforts and supporting school districts, area education agencies and community colleges.

The DE should cooperate with IASB, area education agencies, community colleges, the federal government and state to streamline requests for information.

The DE should consider other student achievement measures, such as value-added or growth measures, for all students, in defining and negotiating the lowa plan for school district compliance with federal requirements.

By its very nature, the DE is a state regulatory agency; however, Congress and the General Assembly should carefully consider the number and size of the regulatory tasks assigned to the DE and financially support the tasks assigned, including the provision of sufficient staff.

AREA EDUCATION AGENCIES

Area education agencies (AEAs) are highly important in helping develop curriculum. AEA assistance to local schools in the areas of emerging technology, professional development and curriculum assessment is of vital importance to assist schools with the mandates of the federal Every Student Succeeds Act.

AEAs are established to provide school districts with specified services in special education, media and other educational areas. Apart from special education, the Legislature and the Department of Education must not require these agencies to perform services that are regulatory in nature.

AEAs must retain their primary function as support agencies for local school districts, including developing and delivering services and programs to support local school improvement plans.

School improvement is a key strategy to meeting economic, political and societal needs. AEAs can assist public schools with career development and transitions to facilitate business/community collaborations offering further opportunities for students.

The governance structure of AEAs must continue to be tied closely to Pre-K-12 public school districts with students who receive the benefits of AEA services. AEAs should not be merged with community colleges. Directors of Pre-K-12 schools boards should continue to elect AEA directors.

AEAs should be assured of equitable, consistent and timely funding and receive adequate funding for mandated programs and services.

COMMUNITY COLLEGES

Community colleges are an integral part of public education and are strong partners with Pre-K-12 schools in the delivery of career and technical education and of enhanced educational offerings at the high school level through concurrent enrollment. As such, they must be funded by both state and local sources in a consistent and equitable manner.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

Generally, IASB opposes a centralization of decision-making on local and state educational issues in the federal bureaucracy and the United States Congress. Iowa citizens have the ability and desire to make decisions affecting the education of their young people. IASB urges Congress, the President of the United States and the U.S. Department of Education to support local control of school districts, continue the commitment to local flexibility, and reward local efforts to improve student achievement. If the federal government decides to intervene in state and local education policy, any mandated changes, particularly those taking energy and focus away from real comprehensive school improvement and student achievement, must be fully funded by federal dollars without a shift from other education resources.

lowa schools should receive federal support equal to other states, based on student needs, to maintain our level of educational excellence. The federal government should not impose intrusive or unnecessarily restrictive or prescriptive laws governing our community schools.

STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT AND ACCOUNTABILITY

1. RESEARCH-BASED INITIATIVES

Supports implementation of initiatives in Iowa's Pre-K-12 education system that:

- Are research-based;
- Are focused on student achievement, and;
- Do not "re-purpose" existing education funds.

2. STANDARDS AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Supports continued progress in the development of rigorous content standards and benchmarks that reflect the real-world knowledge and skills students need to graduate from high school prepared for college or to enter the workforce, including the following state actions:

- Provide and fund technical assistance to help school districts fully implement the Iowa Core Content Standards which define what students should know and be able to do in math, science, literacy, social studies, and 21st Century skills in areas such as financial and technological literacy;
- Continue to improve the implementation of the statewide assessment to ensure alignment to the lowa Core Content standards and provide the necessary funding and technological capacity for every student to successfully complete the assessment;
- Support research-based professional development that provides educators with training, support and time to work together so that they can successfully teach a rigorous curriculum to all students. Ensure that curriculum decisions about how to teach remain in the hands of local schools and teachers;
- Include and fund all the components of successful standards systems: assessments aligned to high expectations, improved and aligned instruction and quality professional development.

IASB supports development of model content standards, recommended assessments and professional development supports in additional content areas but opposes expanding accountability, reporting and accreditation requirements in these areas.

3. PRESCHOOL

Supports continued funding to ensure that all 4 and 5-year-olds have access to the Statewide Voluntary Preschool Program.

Supports an increase in funding from the current weighting of 0.5 to 1.0 full-time equivalent to increase the ability of districts to provide services such as full-day programming and transportation to ensure that all 4 and 5-year-olds have the ability to attend the Statewide Voluntary Preschool Program.

Districts should be given maximum flexibility to assign costs to the program.

4. EARLY LITERACY

Supports the continued development of and funding for research on best practices for improving proficiency in early literacy strategies.

Supports continued funding for professional development and classroom intervention strategies focused on implementing best practices for early literacy in grades PK-3.

Supports the continuation of programs currently funded by the early intervention block grant program with flexibility to use those funds for other K-3 literacy programs if approved by the school board.

Supports additional funding for programs designed to ensure that all students meet literacy expectations by the end of 3rd grade.

5. ENGLISH LEARNERS

Supports sufficient and on-time funding for English-learners (EL) until the students reach proficiency.

6. DROPOUT/AT RISK

Supports the inclusion of dropout prevention and funding for at-risk students in the foundation formula and the inclusion of socio-economic status as a factor in determining a student's at-risk status. Opposes changes to the compulsory age of attendance unless sufficient funds are provided to implement strategies to retain those students.

7. MENTAL HEALTH

Supports efforts to establish comprehensive community mental health systems to offer preventative and treatment services and comprehensive school mental health programs that include:

- In-school and telehealth access for students to mental health professionals;
- Creation of a categorical funding stream designated for mental health professionals;
- Reimbursement by Medicaid and private insurers for in-school services;
- Ongoing teacher, administrator, and support staff training to improve the awareness and understanding of child emotional and mental health needs;
- Integration of suicide prevention and coping skills into existing curriculum;
- Expanding state-funded loan forgiveness programs to include mental health professionals who agree to provide services to schools; and
- An ongoing mental health resources clearinghouse for schools and community providers.

8. SPECIAL EDUCATION - STATE

Supports predictable and timely state funding to serve students receiving special education services at a level that reflects the actual cost including educational programming and health care costs.

9. SPECIAL EDUCATION – FEDERAL

Supports federal commitment to fund 40 percent of the cost of educating students receiving special education services, and requests that the federal government fulfill that long-standing commitment by increasing funding a minimum of 8 percent per year until the 40 percent figure is achieved.

10. AREA EDUCATION AGENCIES

Supports full funding of the area education agencies to provide essential services in a cost-effective manner to school districts including, but not limited to:

- Special education;
- Technology;
- Professional development;
- Curriculum assessment; and
- Student assessment data analysis.

11. SCHOOL CALENDARS

Supports the authority of locally elected school boards to determine the school calendar to best meet student needs, including start dates, year round schools, and other innovations.

EDUCATOR QUALITY

12. TEACHER LEADERSHIP AND DEVELOPMENT

Supports adequate resources for research-based programs and strong instructional leadership, including:

- Teacher leadership and development;
- Beginning teacher mentoring programs;
- Quality professional development programs.

13. MARKET-COMPETITIVE WAGES

Supports providing school districts with incentives and the flexibility to pay market competitive wages for shortage area positions, especially in the areas required to meet graduation and Iowa content standards.

14. BENEFITS

Supports allowing school districts to voluntarily enroll their employees in the state's health, dental and life/long-term disability insurance pools.

15. TEACHER RECRUITMENT & LICENSURE

Supports additional tools to attract individuals to the teaching profession, especially for teacher shortage areas including:

- Alternative teacher licensure upon completion of research-based teaching pedagogy training in addition to content knowledge in a curricular area;
- Pathways for individuals with non-traditional educational backgrounds to meet licensure qualifications;
- Reciprocity agreements with other states with high-quality education programs so as to increase diversity among our certified teachers and administrators;
- Expansion of programs such as: Teach Iowa Scholar, Troops to Teachers, Teacher Intern Program, and others as approved by the Board of Educational Examiners; and
- Programs designed to recruit teachers that will better match the demographic makeup of our student population.
- Advocate for funding of loan forgiveness programs and grants that will make education careers a viable option.

16. STAFF REDUCTIONS

Supports giving school districts and AEAs the option to waive the termination requirements in Iowa Code Section 279.13 to reduce staff in response to reductions in funding.

17. LABOR/EMPLOYMENT LAWS

Supports labor and employment laws that balance the rights of the employees with the rights of management, with an emphasis on student achievement and student safety.

FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY AND STEWARDSHIP

18. SCHOOL FUNDING POLICY

Supports a school foundation formula that:

- Provides sufficient and timely funding to meet education goals;
- Equalizes per pupil funding;
- Provides a funding mechanism for transportation costs that reduces the pressure on the general fund and addresses inequities between school districts;
- Includes factors based on changes in demographics including socio-economic status, remedial programming, and enrollment challenges;
- Reflects actual costs for special education services;
- Incorporates categorical funding in the formula within three years; and
- Includes a mix of state aid and property taxes.

19. SUPPLEMENTAL STATE AID

Supports setting supplemental state aid:

- At a rate that sufficiently supports local districts' efforts to plan, create and sustain world-class schools;
- For FY 2021, by January 31, 2020; and
- For FY 2022 and future budget years, at least 14 months prior to the certification of the school's district budgets.

Setting supplemental state aid within the statutory requirements allows districts to make sound financial decisions on programs, staffing levels, and providing the best possible education to all students.

IASB supports a formula driven method for establishing the supplemental state aid growth rate if it is not set within the statutory requirements.

20. PROPERTY TAXES

Supports holding school districts harmless in property tax restructuring. Supports efforts to minimize property tax disparities created by the additional levy rate without compromising additional resources to school districts. Supports improved transparency and limits on the use of Tax Increment Financing (TIF) including the following requirements:

- To receive input from all affected taxing bodies before creation of a TIF district;
- To limit the duration of all TIF districts.

21. BOND ISSUES

Supports allowing school bond issues to be passed by a simple majority vote.

Supports the authority to levy a combination of property taxes and income surtaxes to pay the indebtedness.

Supports legislation to clarify that revenue bonds do not count toward a 5 percent statutory debt limit.

22. SPECIAL LEVY FUNDS

Supports flexibility in the use of special levy funds.

23. TAX BASE

Supports an independent, bi-annual cost-benefit analysis of all income, sales or property tax exemptions, credits or deductions. Creation of a new tax credit must undergo an independent costbenefit analysis. IASB supports elimination of any tax credits that are deemed not effective and redirect any revenue increases from the elimination of those credits to enhance funding for public education.

Supports the legislature having sole authority to make revisions to definitions that impact taxes, restrict future tax bases or provide additional tax breaks that decrease revenue to the state and either directly or indirectly impact tax revenue for schools.

Opposes a constitutional amendment or statewide voter referendum that would limit taxes, spending or local control impacting education.

24. FRANCHISE FEES

Opposes the imposition of franchise fees on school corporations unless the board of directors agrees to such a fee.

25. UNFUNDED MANDATES

Opposes mandates that do not provide adequate and direct funding for successful implementation.

GOVERNANCE

26. LOCAL ACCOUNTABILITY AND DECISION-MAKING

Supports providing local school boards with decision-making authority regarding methods to accomplish desired educational outcomes. IASB opposes overly restrictive or inefficient limitations which inhibit innovation, efficiency, and the ability of school boards to meet local needs. Local accountability and decision-making includes:

- Student Achievement: As locally elected officials, school boards should have the ability to set priorities, customize programming, and maximize community strengths to improve outcomes for all students;
- Accountability & Reporting: Data collection for state accountability should enhance the ability of school boards to focus on student learning and school improvement. IASB supports streamlining state-level reporting on management operations and eliminating duplicative or inefficient reporting processes;
- Funding flexibility: School boards should have the ability to maximize existing resources to meet local needs;
- Transparency: School boards should have flexibility to provide public access to records in ways that promote transparency for citizens while balancing the cost to taxpayers.

27. EXPANDING EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

Supports providing the flexibility to expand educational opportunities and choices for students and families. Educational options must remain under the sole authority of locally elected school boards charged with representing community interests and accountability. IASB supports efforts including:

• Investment in magnet and innovation schools; expansion in flexible program offerings; and greater partnerships among schools and community organizations

- Establishment of charter schools;
- Establishment or use of on-line schools or classes.

Supports opportunities for continued collaboration between public and non-public schools; however, the association opposes the use of additional taxpayer funds for the creation of vouchers or educational savings accounts or an increase in tax credits or deductions directed toward non-public schools.

28. ELECTIONS

Supports a minimum of four special election dates per calendar year for bond referendums, votes on levies and revenue purpose statements and filling school board vacancies.

29. SHARING AND REORGANIZATION

Supports continuation of sufficient incentives and assistance to encourage sharing or reorganization between school districts including the establishment of regional schools.

30. HOME SCHOOL REPORTING

Supports requiring parents/guardians home-schooling their children without the support of a certified teacher to register with their public-school attendance centers.
