Appropriate Shoes: Protect your children's toes and feet by sending them in sensible shoes which allow them to walk, run, and play safely. Lace-up or slip-on shoes that cover the entire foot are expected to be worn at all times. In addition to other foot wear that school officials would deem unsafe, the following items are <u>NOT</u> allowed to be worn to school: flip-flops and other "opentoed" or "open-heeled" sandals, high heel/platform shoes or boots and oversized shoes/boots.

First Grade News...

Our first graders have been extremely busy learning and having fun!

For LEAD21, we just finished a unit on different kinds of habitats. We have learned about the plants and animals in different habitats, such as the desert, forest, swamp, grassland and ocean. We have discovered that each habitat has the basic needs of the specific plants and animals that live there. Our next LEAD21 unit will shift our focus to how we can become responsible citizens in our community.

In math, we have been working on a variety of concepts. We recently worked on creating doubles and making halves. We discovered how to find volume (cubic units) and height (floors) of different objects. We also learned the names and characteristics of 3D shapes. We are fluent with our number sentences to 10 and 100, and will now turn our focus to working with numbers over 100.

In science, we are starting a new unit called "Pebbles, Sand & Silt". We will work as geologists to compare rocks (trying to find similarities and differences). We will also learn about the names of the different sizes of rocks (clay, silt, sand, gravel, pebbles, cobbles, boulders). We are looking forward to all of the rock experiments and activities!

In writing, we are just finishing up our final reports on an animal of our choice. Next month, we will get to choose a type of writing to create (personal narrative, persuasive, or report) and put our finals into our portfolios. We truly enjoy writing our ideas and sharing them with our classmates!

We are so proud of our first grade students, along with our Fourth Grade Buddies, for all the hard work during the music performance. They had a wonderful performance, as well as a wonderful turnout of family and friends! Thank you to all who were able to attend and support our music program.

Second Grade News...

It has been a great year for our second graders, and the kids are working hard to finish out strong! In Lead 21, the students just finished up their 3rd Quarterly Benchmark Assessment. We have now moved onto unit 7 which is all about Local Leaders. We have been looking at various leaders and workers within our local government and how they help to keep us safe. The students are realizing that they utilize many of the government's local services on a daily basis such as the parks, libraries, trash pick-up, and etc. In Trailblazers, the students are learning all about fractions. They can label the shaded part of a given shape using a fraction. The students learned the terms denominator and numerator and what they mean. In science, the students are learning about air. We've been doing many fun experiments to learn how air moves things, how to compress air, what air resistance is, and what happens when you mix air and water. Continue reading and working on double-digit addition and subtraction facts at home!

Clothing Guidelines...

Below are the guidelines established for the clothing students wear to school. We believe modesty is important for a positive school environment. We ask you to review the following recommendations. If students wear clothing that is unacceptable, we will ask them to change or cover up.

* Wear shirts that cover the shoulders (straps at least 1" wide). This would exclude, as an example, halter tops, back-less shirts, spaghetti straps, strapless tops, tube tops or muscle shirts (with a deep hole under the armpit).

* Shirts and tops should not be cut low in the front or back and should be long enough to tuck into shorts, skirts or pants (no mid-section skin showing).

* Avoid short shorts or short skirts and very low cut pants. Mid-thigh or longer is a comfortable and modest length for shorts and skirts. Please select shorts, pants or skirts that do not have a low cut waist.

* Due to hygiene and health concerns, Do Rags, caps, scarves, sport head bands and wrist bands should not be brought to school.
