Third Grade News...

It's hard to believe that we are nearing the end of 3rd grade, but we are still keeping busy and working hard in our classrooms! In LEAD 21, we recently wrapped up Unit 6, which was about extreme environments. We will be beginning Unit 7 which focuses on ways people make a difference. In math, students have been learning about fractions and working with telling time including elapsed time and converting minutes in to hours and minutes. Along with continuing to practice multiplication facts throughout the next few weeks we will explore decimals, volume, and continue to practice multi-digit addition and subtraction problems with estimation. Our new science kits arrived and we began and will be investigating water through different hands on experiments including water observations, hot and cold water, water vapor, and the water cycle. On Friday, May 13th students will watch and listen to a presentation called Kids on the Block with a focus on disabilities and on Wednesday, May 18th the 3rd graders will be taking a Dubuque Trolley around to different historical landmarks of Dubuque. The 3rd grade teachers would like to thank parents for their efforts at home to help support students with reading, spelling, and math!

Clothing Guidelines...

Below are the guidelines established for the clothing students wear to school. If students wear clothing that is unacceptable, we will ask them to change or cover up.

- * Wear shirts that cover the shoulders (straps at least 1" wide). This would exclude, as an example, halter tops, back-less shirts, spaghetti straps, strapless tops, tube tops or muscle shirts (with a deep hole under the armpit).
- * Shirts and tops should not be cut low in the front or back and should be long enough to tuck into shorts, skirts or pants (no mid-section skin showing).
- * Avoid short shorts or short skirts and very low cut pants. Mid-thigh or longer is a comfortable and modest length for shorts and skirts. Please select shorts, pants or skirts that do not have a low cut waist.
- * Due to hygiene and health concerns, Do Rags, caps, scarves, sport head bands and wrist bands should not be brought to school.
- * Protect your children's toes and feet by sending them in sensible shoes which allow them to walk, run, and play safely. Lace-up or slip-on shoes that cover the entire foot are expected to be worn at all times. In addition to other foot wear that school officials would deem unsafe, the following items are not allowed to be worn to school: flip-flops and other "open-toed" or "open-heeled" sandals, high heel/platform shoes or boots and oversized shoes/boots.
