First Grade News...

In Lead 21, we are finishing Unit 3 in which we learned about the different communities we live in like cities, towns, and countries. We learned the difference between facts and opinions. A fact is something that can be proven. For example, "We all go to Marshall School." An opinion is what we think or believe. For example, "Marshall is the best school." We also focused on monitoring our comprehension by rereading when something does not make sense.

In math, we have focused on measuring objects with different sized units. We have used our footsteps, rulers, small and large paper clips, and pencils. We discovered that the smaller the unit we use, the more we need to measure the length; the larger the unit we use, the less we need to measure the length.

In Social Studies, we have learned there are different groups we can belong to. We can belong to school, family, and community groups. We also focused on the differences between needs and wants. Needs are things we have to have in order to survive and wants are things that are extra (things we don't need but like to have). Since we are in the holiday season, we have also explored the different holidays families may celebrate. We learned about Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, and Christmas. We discussed similarities and differences among these three holidays.

Reading Room News...

Choosing books that are appropriate for your child's reading level can be tricky. If he/she knows every word in a book without hesitation, the book is probably too easy. On the other hand, books that are too hard may make him/her want to give up, and he/she won't be able to focus on understanding the story. If a book is just right, your youngster will be able to read most of the words fairly easily, and it will have just a few tricky words to keep him/her challenged.

Five Finger Rule!

* Choose a book and read the first page or two.

* Put one finger up for every word you don't know.

* If five of your fingers go up while reading, choose another book.

* If two or three fingers go up, you've found a "just right" book.* If no fingers go up this book is probably too easy.

Holiday Giff Ideas...

If you are looking for books for your beginning readers, predictable books are a great choice. Predictable books are ones that repeat the same phrase over and over. These books encourage fluency-and children love reading them. An example of a repeating phrase is: "Brown bear, brown bear, what do you see?" which appears on each page of Bill Martin Jr.'s book Brown, Bear, Brown Bear, What Do You See?

Seeing the same words many times helps your child recognize them. As he/she learns the words, he/she will no longer have to sound them out each time. Then he/she will be able to focus more on the meaning of the story. Even beginning readers can learn to read smoothly by memorizing repeating phrases. Here are several books to try with your youngsters:
