Kindergarten News...

Kindergarten is currently on Unit 6 in lead 21, <u>Life All Around</u>. This unit focuses on the concepts of the characteristics, needs, and growth of living things. We are reading further to answer the questions: What are livings things? How do plants and animals grow and change?

In math our focus this month is on using standard and non- standard units of measuring. We will be learning about fractions and proportions. We are also comparing numbers, determining one less and one more than a target number, as well as greater than, less than or equal to.

In Social Studies we discussed the process of the Presidential Election going on now in connection to President's Day in February. We incorporated our previous unit of Lead 21 to identify the different "symbols" of our country. For example: the flag, statue of liberty, the eagle, etc.

Fifth Grade News...

Language Arts – Students are just completing a unit called New People, New Places. In this unit we discussed how our country began and how it continues to change over time. They also are working on making timelines that answer the question, "What events have shaped America?"

Math – Fifth grade is finishing a unit on decimals and probability. Our next unit will teach the connections to division and the methods we use to divide and the importance of remainders.

Science – We are just finishing the unit on Living Systems and will soon be going in to the Sun, Moon, and Planets unit. In Living Systems, students made and maintained a red worm habitat and talked about composting. They grew wheat grass and studied the importance of light and nutrients on plants. At the time of this writing, we are waiting for our butterflies to "spread their wings" and continue to look at their digestive systems and how they compare to ours. All of this has been interesting but has lent itself to some unusual smells from our 5th grade classrooms.

Career Café – Fifth grade feels extremely lucky to be able to listen to community members share information about their jobs. Thanks to Ms. Hunold who organizes all of this!!! About once a month, students get to choose what speaker they want to listen to and while they eat lunch, are informed about the requirements. benefits and stories involved with their jobs. We have had engineers, police, firefighters, county conservation, nurse, writers, chefs, to name just a few. What a great opportunity for our students to learn about job opportunities and start to think about their future!

5th Grade students have been participating in Career Café once again this school year. Career Café is a fun way to learn about different career opportunities as well as meet different members of the Dubuque community.

During each Career Café opportunity, several community members are invited to speak to small groups of students during their lunch period. They tell about their position and field questions from the students. So far this year we have had the pleasure of exploring a variety of careers such as: an engineer, a park ranger, a police officer, an aesthetician/massage therapist, a social worker, a retail manager, the owner of a construction company, and a court reporter.

Career Café is a great learning experience for our students. It is important to begin career exploration at a young age because it can expose students to career paths they may have never considered. It also enables them to test out who they are against the real world and begin to wrap their heads around the many career opportunities actually available. In addition, career exploration helps students to begin to understand how they feel about various types of work, working conditions, and work activities. Finally, career exploration helps students start to understand why they are in school as well as the various post-high school education and training options and/or requirements.
