Technology is on the rise at Marshall. Preschool, kindergarten, and first grades all have five new iPad airs each and an iPad storage cabinet, too. The iPads in the classrooms are primarily used for Lexia and ST Math, but can also be used for SeeSaw, iMovie, Chatter Pix, and much more! We are so excited and grateful to the Dubuque Community School District for providing our school with these new devices.

# Keyboarding...

Keyboarding skills are essential to becoming a 21st century learner. Keyboarding is currently being taught to both 2<sup>nd</sup> grade classrooms. The students are using www.typingclub.com to practice typing skills. Students can use this Web site at home to practice. The faster the students can type the easier it is for students to perform daily writing tasks in the classroom. In addition to Typingclub.com students can also log onto www.typing.com the same way they log into their Clever accounts. Keyboarding is currently being reviewed in all grades, 2<sup>nd</sup>- 5<sup>th</sup>. Any time the students can get more keyboarding practice the better typist they will become.

First graders will begin learning keyboarding skills right after Thanksgiving break. Students will be introduced to typing and then we will practice each day consecutively until winter break for approximately 20 minutes per session. Hopefully the initial instruction and practice will encourage students to become accurate and efficient typists which will then lead to an employable skill and become a skill for the students' lifetime.

## Office 865...

Office 365 is currently available to all students who attend Dubuque Community School District. All students, kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup>

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grades, are aware of their usernames and passwords to log into Office 365 from any Internet connected device. All Microsoft applications such as MS Word, MS PowerPoint, MS Excel, MS Outlook, etc. are available for a free download to a student's home computer. Simply access the student's Office 365 account via the Marshall Web page. ## Fifth Grade News...

In Lead 21, students just completed a unit called, "Seeking the Unknown." In this unit, students are researching why people explore the unknown. The focus question of the unit is, "Why do

people seek the unknown?"
Students have also been
working on a persuasive essay
in writing. They were able to
choose their own topic and
wrote to persuade other students
to agree with them. Have your
child tell you about the topic
that they chose and see if they
can persuade you!

In Math, students are focusing on area and division. Students have learned many different ways to find area, including using the algorithm, length x width. We have also started to learn long division. Although this is challenging, we have spent several days working on strategies to help us divide. Please continue practicing math facts at home.

We are also working in a unit in Science called, "Mixtures and Solutions." Students have been introduced to some fundamental ideas in the field of chemistry. Students will develop a stronger understanding of the properties of mixtures and solutions.

### Counselor News...

Classroom guidance lessons are well under way! All grade levels have been learning about group work and cooperation. They have all practiced the skills necessary to work together in a group. Students participated in activities geared at learning skills such as listening, making sure everyone is contributing, accepting others' ideas, using kind/respectful language, making suggestions rather than demands, encouraging others, and using patience.

As we continue to work together throughout the school year, we will revisit these skills. It's important for students to understand how to work with other people not just at school; but at home as a part of their family, when they play on a team, and, eventually, when they have a career.

During the month of November, guidance time in many classrooms will be spent working on the health curriculum. We will talk about the medical terms for our body parts as well as the ways in which boys' and girls' bodies differ. In addition, we will learn how to keep our bodies safe from unwanted/uncomfortable touches and learn/review the body safety rules: "No, Go, Yell, Tell!"

Help Your Child Succeed in School: **Build the Habit of Good Attendance Early** 

School success goes hand in hand with good attendance!

#### DID YOU KNOW?

- · Starting in kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10 percent (or about 18 days) can make it harder to learn to read.
- · Students can still fall behind if they miss just a day or two days every few weeks.
- · Being late to school may lead to poor attendance.
- · Absences can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.

Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school—and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, every day is important. Good attendance will help children do well in high school, college, and at work.

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO

- · Set a regular bed time and morning routine.
- · Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Find out what day school starts and make sure your child has the required shots.
- Introduce your child to her teachers and classmates before school starts to help her transition.
- Don't let your child stay home unless she is truly sick. Keep in mind complaints of a stomach ache or headache can be a sign of anxiety and not a reason to stay home.
- If your child seems anxious about going to school, talk to teachers, school counselors, or other parents for advice on how to make her feel comfortable and excited about learning.
- Develop back-up plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, a neighbor, or another parent.
- Avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school is in session.
