During the week of May 23rd – 27th I have continued to wrap up small groups and work with other students on transitioning into summer and middle school. This week I would like to continue to give you information on things to ponder if you are leaving your child home alone for the first time. KidsHealth.org would like you to consider the following factors: Think about the area where you live, how does your child feel about staying home alone? Does your child show signs of responsibility with things like homework,

household chores, and following directions? How does your child handle unexpected situations? How calm does your child stay when things don't go as planned? Does your child understand and follow rules? Can your child understand and follow safety measures? Does your child make good judgments or is he or she prone to taking risks? Does your child know basic first-aid procedures? Does your child follow your instructions about staying away from strangers? Babysitting Considerations

Not all kids who are ready to stay home alone are ready to babysit younger kids. Make sure an older child left to care for younger siblings has the babysitting experience and skills you would require of a babysitter you hired. Before your child starts babysitting, consider enrolling him or her in a babysitting class. Check with the American Red Cross or your local YMCA about such classes.



Home Alone Laws

Most states don't have laws saying when kids are old enough to stay home alone or babysit younger kids. But many states do have guidelines for parents, which are distributed through the local or state government's department of child protective services.
