

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Dear Parent(s):

Have you ever heard your child(ren) mention something about 'PBIS' at Roosevelt and wonder to yourself, what exactly is that? Well, let me start by sharing with you that PBIS stands for Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports. It's an organizational structure implemented here at Roosevelt that allows us to create a positive learning community for everyone. It's not a curriculum or lock-step program, but instead a structure for how we positively interact and work with students. This structure is built on a school-wide philosophy that our staff will teach, model, and reinforce the positive student behaviors needed to be successful. With these supports in place, it will allow your child(ren), and all students, to achieve behaviorally and academically this year. If the acronym PBIS does not sound familiar, my guess is that you might have overheard talk about some of the monthly activities that we offer to promote and encourage a positive culture with our students, or maybe you've heard about the three guiding principles for our program. Here at Roosevelt we strive to promote a culture where students can demonstrate that they are Ready to learn, Responsible for what they do, and Respectful in their actions. We call these three words the 3 R's of our PBIS program. Students who demonstrate the three R's are recognized by our staff members with a Raptor Recognition Ticket. These tickets are a recognition shown to the student for their appropriate display of behavior at school. Students can then use these tickets for the monthly PBIS events, or other special activities provided by their house teachers. In November our monthly event was Bingo, and in December we will have our annual winter movie. We continue to use the PBIS structure because it works for our kids!

It's time to get the Flu Shot for your family!

The symptoms of influenza (flu) appear suddenly and often include:

- * Fever of 100F to 104F, which can reach 106F when symptoms first develop. Fever is usually continuous, but it may come and go.

Fever may be lower in older adults than in children and younger adults. When fever is high, other symptoms usually are more severe.

- * Body aches and muscle pain (often severe), commonly in the back, arms, or legs.

- * Headache

- * Pain when you move your eyes.

- * Fatigue, a general feeling of sickness (malaise), and loss of appetite.

- * A dry cough, runny nose, and dry or sore throat. You may not notice these during the first few days of the illness when other symptoms are more severe. As your fever goes away, these symptoms may become more evident.

If your child is ill, PLEASE keep them home to avoid passing the illness to their class. DCSD requires a student to be free of fever (without Tylenol or Ibuprofen), vomiting or diarrhea for 24 hours before returning to school.

The new Eleanor Roosevelt Victory Garden has been established with the completion of the first 5 raised garden beds.

Through the generosity of local donors including The Dubuque Mission (Ashley Neises), B & W Builder (Scott Weimerskirch), DCSD Building and Grounds (Bill Burkhart), Midwest Organic Solutions (Jake and Craig), and Jim Cushman (community volunteer), 5 very sturdy raised garden beds were constructed of locally harvested and milled pin oak. The beds should last for many years, providing much enjoyment and use by ERMS students and the greater community.

The long-term plan for the ERMS Garden Club is to create an outdoor space where both growing and learning can happen. Organically-grown produce will nourish our students and our neighbors in need. Native pollinator plantings, vegetable beds, compost bins, student seating, bird houses and even fruit trees will be featured.
