Dear Parent(s):



I am often asked by parents, "What should I be doing at home to help my child?" My honest answer is always this-you can best support your child by having regular conversations with them about school. The best place for that to happen is at the dinner table, or anywhere over a meal that you are sharing together. Your child may not seem interested in talking, but I have found that most students really do want to share their experiences. With the right question(s), I assure you your child will talk! The conversations you have can be about anything. It can be about new learning, about an activity he or she is involved in, or about new friends being made here at school. In whatever your child shares, always be sure to validate what is being said and how he or she feels. Each day we are thankful as a staff for being able to help in the education of your child, yet we know that parents/guardians are the most important educator. Your discussions at home with your child are important in ensuring success here at school. Please do not hesitate to call or email your child's teachers, counselors, or any of the support staff here in the office for assistance. We are here to help!

Our second round of Parent-Teacher-Student conferences is right around the corner! Conference dates are Thursday, February 8, Wednesday, February 14, and Thursday, February 15. Last week you should have received an email letter from me with details on times, along with information on signing up for a conference time online. Please call the office if you need any assistance. Thank you for taking the time to come to Roosevelt and learn more closely about the learning that has occurred so far, and will be happening with the remainder of the year.

Monday through Thursday of each week we begin our school day with community building time in our homeroom setting. You may have heard your child speak of this research-based program we call *Raptor Time*. Staff members begin 'Raptor Time' each day promptly at 7:38 AM. Some students are arriving after this start time and are tardy to school. In order to have everyone present for this important start to the day, if you drive your child to school, we ask that you arrive by the entry time of 7:30 AM. This will allow your child ample time to get to the house area, go to the locker and get organized for the day, and be ready to participate in the *Raptor Time* activities by 7:38 AM.
