notes from mr. lass

Dear Parent(s):



At this time of the year there seems to be quite a lot of education news. Much of the news comes from the Statehouse as this is the time the state lawmakers and governor look at improving education for the students of lowa. At a special press conference, Governor Branstad rolled out his recommendations for the state's K-12 education system. Some of the recommendations included:

• Higher standards for teacher preparation programs in which prospective teachers would have to have a 3.0 GPA in college to apply for teacher training.

- Annual evaluation of all teachers in our schools.
- Annual evaluation of all administrators
- Assess all 4 year olds with school readiness tests.

• Before graduation, high school students will need to take end of course tests in the CORE subject areas.

There are several other recommendations, but space does not allow their placement here. It will be interesting to see how the state lawmakers react to all of these proposed changes in education.

IDM Program

Instructional Decision Making (IDM) is a practice that asks teachers to make instructional decisions based on the identified learning needs of students. At ERMS we implement these decisions not only during regular classroom instruction, but also during our "IDM time."

IDM time is a time for teachers to work with students of similar learning needs. These groups meet daily around the lunch period. During their IDM time, students are given additional practice or instruction to develop their skills through intensive or supplemental instruction.

Attend, Eat, Learn

When one thinks about the benefits of attending school regularly, often what comes to mind are academic outcomes: building skills, reading on grade level, grade promotion. While these are all critically important, there is another important benefit that children can only access when they are present – school breakfast, school lunch and in some cases afterschool snacks and meals. Three out of four public school teachers say that their students regularly come to school hungry. Eightyone percent of teachers say that children come to their classrooms hungry more than once a week.

The research is clear. Hunger makes it difficult to learn, increases behavioral problems, and has a long term negative impact on health outcomes. On the flip side, consistent access to nutritious meals makes a significant and positive impact, particularly on students experiencing poverty. Students who aren't experiencing hunger are more alert, have improved concentration, are less likely to be referred to the office for disciplinary reason and perform better on test.

WALKING/BUSSING GUIDELINES FOR DISTRICT PROVIDED TRANSPORTATION

Transportation often "catch's" families by surprise when we share walk boundaries for elementary, middle, and high school (especially the transition from middle school to high school when the walk boundary changes from 2-miles to 3-miles). This means that if your primary residence is less than 3 miles from High School you will NOT receive busing to High School for free.

> DCSD Policy: Chapter 7: AUXILIARY SERVICES 7100 Section 2: TRANSPORTATION Student Transportation

The policy, rules and regulations for the transportation of pupils to and from school shall be in strict compliance with Iowa Code, Chapter 285, State Department of Education regulations, and rules and regulations established and approved by the Board of Directors.

Elementary school students (K through 8) living two miles or more and secondary school students (9 through 12) living three miles or more from a designated attendance center will be furnished transportation or reimbursement.

Below is the lowa Code and our DCSD School Board policy concerning walk boundaries and eligibility to ride school buses free.

Iowa Code 285.1 WHEN ENTITLED TO STATE AID.

1. a. The board of directors in every school district shall provide transportation, either directly or by reimbursement for transportation, for all resident pupils attending public school, kindergarten through twelfth grade, except that:

(1) Elementary pupils shall be entitled to transportation only if they live more than two miles from the school designated for attendance.

(2) High school pupils shall be entitled to transportation only

if they live more than three miles from the school designated for attendance.

Please be aware of this distance change when making arrangements for high school transportation of your student.





This year, there were over 270 individual photographs that passed through the judges hands.

- Gold Keys are awarded to the top 5-7% of all entries;
- Silver Keys are awarded to the top 7-10% of all entries;
- Honorable Mention is awarded to the top 10-15% of all entries.

In addition, Gold Key winners' works are sent on to New York where they are adjudicated a second time in a pool including all photographs nationally. All Gold, Silver and Honorable Mentions will be on display in a video/slide show on the Scholastic Art and Writing Awards website. Check out our very own ERMS Key Winners!







