trees for kids

On October 12, 21 students from 6th and 7th grade from Eleanor Roosevelt Middle School performed a service project along with students from Bryant School, Loras College, and the University of Dubuque by participating in lowa's DNR program of "Trees for Kids". This program was established by the Department of Natural Resources in 2001 and awards applicants with grants up to \$5000 to plant landscape trees on school or organizational grounds. In 2014, 1600 trees were planted that involved 5,200 youth in Iowa. The program was at the Mines of Spain and the recreation area received 32 trees to be used in their prairie project and landscaping around their new workshop. The students were chosen by Mr. Dolan and Mrs. Specht. Mr. Dolan sits on the board of the Friends of the Mines Spain and was asked by Wayne Buchholtz DNR Ranger to help with the planting. The following 21 students participated in the project. They are: Dylan Abitz, Beth Johll, Kaeli Wagner, Luke Tressel, Olivia Fessler, Ava Terwilleger, Logan Ellis, Jared Thomas, Maddie Herrig, Jaelyn Tigges, Kyra Townsend, Emma Hilkin, Payton Weber, Riley Weber, Sydney Hall, Reggie Porter, Brady Davis, Colin Koot, Mackezie Lessears, Colton Bries and Payton Fay. The students were taught about the types of trees they were to plant, how to plant trees, and the challenges that the state of lowa faces with invasive species that attack lowa with the latest pest the Emerald Tree Borer attacking the White Ash. It was a beautiful day and the task was finished in approximately two hours. Great job RAPTORS !!!



Service Day At Mines of Spain Recreation Day

On October 19th, House 6-2 traveled to the Mines of Spain for a day of historical and environmental activities. House 6-2 over the years has had a fall field trip to the Mines of Spain to learn more about one part of Dubuque's heritage the E. B. Lyons Mines of Spain Recreation area. The day has looked at the prairie ecosystem in the park. One hundred and fifty years ago, 85% of lowa was covered with prairie. Today less than one tenth of one percent still remains. Efforts across lowa to reclaim land for prairie have attempted to bring back this natural resource to lowa's environment. Our day is divided up into four parts. One part deals with the ecosystem know as a prairie. Student learn about the organisms that inhabit the prairie and the food chains that contribute to the complex food webs in the ecosystem. Students also participate in a scavenger hunt to look at the history of the Mines of Spain and its contribution to the history of Dubuque. Next, the students are shown some of the plant organisms that are invasive species challenging the ecosystem of the Recreation Area. They are also shown plant species native to the prairie. Students are prepped on how to pick grass and forb seeds to be used in the reclamation of prairie from farmland. In the afternoon, students are transported to a mature prairie in the park. There they pick seed to save the park thousands of dollars in seed costs. A pound of various prairie seed can cost hundreds of dollars. The day teaches stewardship of the land that we must practice if we are to save low a's environment for future generations of Iowans. Way to go RAPTORS of House 6-2.

stem day 2015!

The skies were filled with the trails of smoke from the Viking rockets that sixth graders had built in preparation for Eleanor Roosevelts Middle School's second annual STEM DAY on October 15th. The STEM DAY replaced Rocket Day, in an attempt to broaden sixth graders exposure to science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. Besides rockets and CEV (Crew Escape Vehicles) which are the base activities that all sixth graders participate in, Roosevelt was visited by people whose occupation has a STEM connection.

IIW PC had our students building skyscrapers and bridges as their contribution to the day. The Catfish Creek Watershed group taught our kids the importance of conservation in a watershed. Jason Martin-Hiner from Keystone AEA showed how 3-D printing is becoming an important part of our everyday lives. Swiss Valley Nature Center showed how a GPS could be used in a recreational activity by caching objects for sport. We also had another representative of Keystone who showed the importance of robotics and coding in the 21st century. Our partners from the University of Dubuque under the leadership of Dr. Debra Stork led her pre-service teachers in activities in ecology, engineering, aerospace science, and environmental science. With this wide number of classes and activities, students were exposed to what careers in science, technology, and engineering might look like. The demand for the filling of STEM occupations in the future will a challenge that the world will face. Hopefully this experience will spark our students in considering a STEM career. The sixth grade teachers want to thank all who made this day a great success.
