


ELEANOR **ROOSEVELT REPORT** MIDDLE SCHOOL

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Dear Parent(s):

On behalf of Assistant Principals Mrs. Duvel and Mr. Lawler, and all staff here at Roosevelt, I want to welcome you to the first edition of the parent newsletter for the 2016-17 school year. It is with great excitement that I write this first entry to the newsletter as your new principal. It's been an exciting and wonderful start to the school year. As I go about the building, I have been impressed with the wonderful learning experiences that our teachers have designed. We truly have a superb teaching staff! I have also been excited to see the cooperative and collaborative way the students are working together in the classrooms. It is evident that our students are learning each and every day.

As I sit at my desk writing this newsletter, we have just completed our first week of the Measurements of Academic Progress (MAP) testing. These computerized assessment tests allow us to determine your child's current instructional level. It also allows us to measure academic growth from fall to spring during the school year. By the publishing date of this newsletter, we will have completed the fall round of testing, with the window closing on September 30. With that said, I want to take a moment to share my sincere appreciation for your support and encouraging words at home regarding the importance of this test. Thank you! Our next round of important standardized testing will come in early November when we administer the ITP (Iowa Testing Program), formerly the ITBS tests. I will be providing more information on this in our next newsletter.

In October, we will once again be conducting our annual school fundraiser. We will continue to partner with Pinnacle Fundraising, as we have since the opening of our school in 2005. This year we want to raise money to purchase a new projector for the auditorium. Our current projector is two years past its expected life cycle. Last year's fundraiser was used to purchase a new high definition screen for the stage. The installation of a new projector will truly compliment the screen and allow students to have a 'cinema-type' experience when involved in presentations in the auditorium. We also want to use some of the fundraiser money to purchase LED flat screen displays for our main hallways and foyer area. These will be used to share student announcements, PBIS announcements, school pictures, and many other visual ways of communicating with students and staff.

It's time to get the Flu Shot for your family!

The symptoms of influenza (flu) appear suddenly and often include:

- * Fever of 100F to 104F, which can reach 106F when symptoms first develop. Fever is usually continuous, but it may come and go. Fever may be lower in older adults than in children and younger adults. When fever is high, other symptoms usually are more severe.

- * Body aches and muscle pain (often severe), commonly in the back, arms, or legs.

- * Headache.

- * Pain when you move your eyes.

- * Fatigue, a general feeling of sickness (malaise), and loss of appetite.

- * A dry cough, runny nose, and dry or sore throat. You may not notice these during the first few days of the illness when other symptoms are more severe. As your fever goes away, these symptoms may become more evident.

If your child is ill, PLEASE keep them home to avoid passing the illness to their class. DCSD requires a student to be free of fever (without Tylenol or Ibuprofen), vomiting or diarrhea for 24 hours before returning to school.



Eleanor Roosevelt Middle School 7th Graders Named State Winners in the 14th Annual eCYBERMISSION STEM Competition



U.S. Army Educational Outreach Program Provides a National Platform for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics

Dubuque, Iowa. May 6, 2016 – The U.S. Army today announced 7th grade Charlamberly from **Dubuque, Iowa as a 1st place state winner** in the 14th annual eCYBERMISSION competition – one of several science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) initiatives offered by the U.S. Army Educational Outreach Program (AEOP).

eCYBERMISSION, sponsored by the U.S. Army and administered by the National Science Teachers Association (NSTA), is a web-based STEM competition free to students. Designed to inspire student interest in STEM, eCYBERMISSION challenges students in grades six through nine to develop solutions to real-world problems in their local communities.

Students compete on state, regional, and national levels for up to \$9,000 in U.S. EE Savings Bonds, valued at maturity.

Team Charlamberly, consisting of Amber Loney, Charlotte Harwood, and Chloe Timmerman, worked together with team advisor **Julie Bahl** to **Investigate appropriate food storage temperatures to slow spoilage**. Student teams submit their official project through the eCYBERMISSION website to be evaluated and scored by a panel of volunteer virtual judges. State winning 1st place teams receive \$1,000 per student in U.S. EE Savings Bonds.

“The U.S. Army is very proud of the students that have accepted the challenge to this STEM competition in efforts to improve their communities,” said Louie R. Lopez, AEOP Cooperative Agreement Manager. “Congratulations to all the state winning teams and we encourage students to continue along the path of creativity and innovation.”

“We are delighted with all the amazing projects that came through this year,” said Dr. Carolyn Hayes, NSTA President. “We congratulate the state winners and commend all of the team advisors for investing time in their students to help make a real difference in the world around them.”

In the next round of the eCYBERMISSION competition, a panel of virtual judges will evaluate the top three scores from each region in each grade level. Sixty regional finalist teams will compete to advance as one of 20 national finalists, moving on to compete at the National Judging and Educational Event (NJ&EE)—June 20-24 in Washington, D.C.

Raptors to Washington D.C. for eCybermission

On June 20th, 2016, four sixth graders from House 6-2 boarded a United Airlines Flight to Dulles Airport near Washington D.C to participate in the National eCybermission National Judging and Educational Event in Leesburg, VA. Ecybermission is a web-based Army sponsored, SCIENCE, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics competition to identify and solve challenges in their communities. The program was developed around the U.S. Army's mission to engage a broad spectrum of American youth in STEM. The overall goal is to improve student performance STEM and encourage careers in these fields.


The four students Colin Koot, Miah Phalen, Luke Onderick, and Peyton Weber were given a five day experience with the United States Army's Research and Development Command to present their research on the community problem of the invasive species plant Reed Canary Grass. This species of grass is widespread in Iowa, but is harmful to the native grasses and plants of Iowa's prairies and woodlands. The student created an herbicide of vinegar, lemon juice, and dish soap that would be more environmentally safe herbicide to use in the eradication of the invasive species.

The team won at the state and regional level to earn its way to the national judging contest. They experienced tours in Washington D.C., heard presentations, participated in workshops, and had their project judges. They were one of over 4000 teams who participated and one of 5 six grade teams to make it to the finals. Besides their free trip to the finals, the students won \$4000 of United States Savings Bonds to be used for their college educations. Highlights for the students was the tour of the Capitol and the meeting of US Senator Joni Ernst of Iowa. The eating of MREs for lunch and exercise at 6:00 a.m. in the morning conducted by their US Army NCO leaders. They also presented their final project to the President of the National Science Teachers Association and the head of the Biology Department at the US Military Academy at West Point.

It is often said that it takes an entire village to educate a child. For an endeavor of this sort many people made this once in lifetime experience possible. Mr. Dale Lass and Mr. Jeff Johl lent their support for this to take place. Mr. Mike Cyze of the Forum staff and Superintendent Stan Rheingans provided help from the district level. Mrs. Laura Stanner provided expertise with technology advice from Keystone AEA along with Mrs. Putchio technology lead teacher. Mrs. Hendricks the Business Manger provided her expertise in filling out the many forms that were necessary. The students were accompanied by Mr. Dolan Team Advisor and Mrs. Dana Koot Team Chaperone.


