# **Course Overview:**

U.S. History: 1900 to Present is a two credit, two-semester course. This course is intended to develop in students a deep appreciation and awareness of this country's achievements and failures or shortcomings. A basic chronological order with thematic infusions will be used to cover the significant events that have shaped the country's development in the Twentieth Century. Units of study will focus on topics such as Progressivism, America in World War I, The Jazz Age, The Depression and New Deal Era, America in World War II and The Development of America since 1945.

### **Units of Study:**

- 1.) Becoming a World Power: 1898-1920 (Immigration, Industrialization, Progressive Movement, Spanish American War, Expansion, WWI.)
- 2.) A Modern Nation: 1919-1940: (Jazz Age, Great Depression, & New Deal)
- 3.) A Champion of Democracy: 1939-1960: (WWII, Cold War, & Postwar America)
- 4.) A Nation Facing Challenges: 1954-1975: (New Frontier and Great Society, Civil Rights Movement, Vietnam War, Social Change)
- 5.) Looking Toward the Future: 1968-Present: (A Search for Order, A Conservative Era, Into the Twenty-First Century)

### **Class Activities:**

This class will consist of a variety of activities including, but not limited to, note taking, lecture, class discussion, cooperative activities, group and individual projects, as well as research, essay writing and utilizing video components.

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1.) <u>Tardy Expectations</u>: Tardiness can be disruptive to class, and can show a lack of respect to everyone. <u>If you are not in the classroom when the bell rings, you are tardy.</u> You will get two freebies, <u>if after your second tardy you are still late for class you will receive a 15 minute detention to be served before 7:40 or after 2:20 in my classroom, or arranged by the AP Office, plus your parents and the AP Office will be contacted and you will be set up on a "Credit Preservation Contract"</u>

\*\*It should also be noted that I will implement the tardy policy of our school to the fullest extent, so it will be in your best interest to be in the classroom before the bell rings.

## 2.) Classroom Behavior Expectations and Participation Guidelines:

- > It will be required that you are respectful to yourself, your fellow peers and your teacher.
- > It is expected that you will be fully engaged during class time. If you are tired you will need to get your sleep somewhere else. I will not allow you to mentally check out during class time. I will do everything I can to keep you engaged. Come to class willing and ready to learn.
- > Bring proper materials to class each day (text, notebook, folder, pen and pencil)
- Electronics: Cell Phones: I own one and think they are wonderful, and they are allowed at Senior, but they are not to be on, or in sight in the classroom. If you have a cellphone out during a test/quiz you place yourself in jeopardy of possibly receiving an automatic "ZERO" on that test/quiz. Also, those caught using cell phones during class time will have them confiscated per school policy and may arrange to have them picked up at the AP office.
- ➤ Using your MP3 during class time will not be allowed.
- > Please dispose of any liter in the proper bin or wastebasket.
- > Remain seated until the dismissal bell rings. No Hovering by the door
- > \*\*I will allow bottled water in the classroom, however in accordance with the school district's wellness policy, <u>ABSOLUTELY NO FOOD IS ALLOWED</u>. Also <u>no soda pop, juice</u>, etc. will be allowed as well. (<u>BOTTLED WATER-ONLY</u>)
- > CLASS PARTICIPATION EXPECTATIONS: Contribute to class discussions. Pay attention to lectures, audio/video, and guest speakers with a heads up style and attitude. Work on class-related assignments.
- > If you must leave the room during class time, you must have a pass signed by me.

# **Attend Class:**

<u>Grades and attendance seem to go hand in hand</u>. A certain amount of material that is NOT in the textbook will be presented in class. A number of exam questions will come from material presented exclusively in class lectures or handouts. If you are in the building

but did not attend class (field trip for example), stop by to find out what was covered in class that day and pick up any materials.

# Make up work policy:

Turn in all assignments on time. This gives you a better chance of receiving a higher grade! IT IS YOUR RESPONISBILITY TO MAKE ARRANGEMENTS TO MAKE UP YOUR MISSING WORK. All makeup work assigned following an excused absence will be completed by the arranged deadlines or Zero credit will be received. Also, if you do not have an assignment completed by the deadline assigned, you should check with me to see what you need to do to make up the missed work. I will take late work TWO days past the original due date and the highest grade earned on that will be up to (50%) credit. A weekend (Saturday & Sunday) will also count as two days. If there are extenuating circumstances please discuss them with me. All make-up exams will be given in Rm. B-133 during your free period & when supervision is available. Failure to make-up an exam within three class days of the test date will result in a zero.

# Read, Study, and Take Notes Actively:

Passively writing down material or what I say in class will not help you learn or understand the material. It is your responsibility as a student to stay mentally active during class.

There may be opportunities for extra credit throughout the Year. I will let you know!!

#### **GRADING EXPECTATIONS:**

Grades will be determined by assignments, quizzes, exams, and projects. Additional work may include power point projects, research/computer work, take-home exams, book reports, movie reviews, research projects, class presentations and essays. Note: Some assignments may be graded, some may not.

Grades are weighted: Classwork/Homework 40% Quizzes & Tests 60%

The grading scale is as follows:

90% = A 80% = B 70% = C 60% = D 59% = failure for the course

## IF YOU EXPERIENCE PROBLEMS, SEEK SOLUTIONS EARLY!

For example, if you do poorly on an assignment, exam or project, see me at that time. If I can help you or point you in the right direction, I certainly will, but you have to let me know first. If you have any questions, concerns, or criticisms, please see me so we can discuss how to correct the problem. I will not use class time to discuss these issues, but I am always willing to meet with you either before/after school or during my prep time.

#### ACADEMIC HONESTY

You will receive a zero for any of the following: having a cell phone out during any kind of exam (Quiz, Test, etc...), cheating on an exam, copying or letting someone copy assignments, turning in work that is not your own, or plagiarism. (Be aware!!) If you are the student letting another student copy off of you; you will receive a Zero as well. Remember: It is better to fail class content rather than fail the test of your character.
